Conti Selected For Borough Council

Sayreville Democrat Vincent Conti, 50, was selected to fill the unexpired council term of David McGill, who resigned for health and personal reasons in May. McGill was a unanimous choice to fill Victoria Kilpatrick's unexpired term on the council seat, which runs through Dec. 31, 2020, when she was sworn in as mayor on Jan. 1st. Conti was a commissioner on the Sayreville Economic and Redevelopment Agency (SERA). He is also treasurer and Director of Sports Operations at Sayreville Athletic Association. The two other candidates considered for the post were Thomas Pollando and Michael D'Addio.

Conti and Council President Mary Novak will run on the Democratic ticket in November for two 3-year terms on the council.

Sayreville Rally Draws 300

On Saturday, June 6th, a Black Lives Matter rally was held near the Sayreville Borough Municipal building. An estimated 300-plus crowd attended the event, which was organized by three Sayreville War Memorial High School graduates, who said they wanted to "raise awareness about the struggles of African Americans in Sayreville, New Jersey and America as a whole."

The march was peaceful and the participants walked down MacArthur Ave., Main St., and Dolan St. Prior to the march, several dignitaries spoke to the crowd. The speakers were Sayreville Mayor Victoria Kilpatrick, new councilman Vincent Conti, Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin, and Rev. Joseph Oniyama of Calvary Baptist Church in East Orange.





Growing up in South Amboy The Way it Was-Summer Afternoons

It's a lazy summer afternoon with nothing to do, while we hung out at Astarita's store on Stevens Avenue. Doing what? Well, we talked about girls, baseball (who is better Willie, Mickey or Duke?), cars, music and whatever anyone wanted to talk and argue about. Many of the world's problems were solved on those "lazy" afternoons. Maybe a little card game up the alley, until the cops broke it up. Out of boredom someone would say: Let's go over to the St Mary's schoolyard and play some steamin-in. Steamin-in? What the h... is that? It's a game that only required a broom handle and a 25-cent Spalding rubber ball. It had to be a Spalding! And we played it on the concrete portion of the schoolyard. With colored chalk we would draw a strike zone on one of the concrete walls, and let the game begin. What made this game enjoyable was that you only needed two to play. If you had more players, they could wait until one guy made an out then in came the next guy. The new player would replace the pitcher, while the pitcher got his turn at bat. Sounds simple doesn't it? There were no innings, we played until we got bored. Then it was back to Astarita's until it was time to head home for supper. After supper we gathered back at Astarita's to talk about: girls, baseball, cars whatever until it was time to go home to watch TV.

Some of my favorite TV shows in 1955 included: Gunsmoke, The Honeymooners, The Milton Berle Show, Dragnet, Sgt. Bilko, Your Hit Parade, The Perry Como Show and The Red Skelton Show, (my favorite!), and of course, there was night baseball on Tuesday and Friday, on Channel 9, we watched the Dodgers, and on Channel 11, the New York Giants and Yankees. Is it my imagination, but wasn't TV better back then? Even though we watched on a 12-inch, B&W TV.

Do you Remember Marco Marcelo? (His photos were in The SA Times last month in the May issue). He lived on Catherine Street, and drove around town in a big car, a Cadillac, I think. He would come running out on the stage during the show in a funny costume and smack Milton in the face

whenever he said "Make Up!" A South Amboy celebrity.

A few hits that year included: Rock Around the Clock, Cherry Pink and Apple Blossom White, Autumn Leaves, Unchained Melody, Sincerely, Earth Angel and Only You. Your Hit Parade singers: Dorothy Collins, Snooky Lanson, Russell Arms and Gisele Mc Kenzie. Sponsor? Lucky Strike. Songs cost only a nickel on the JB. And, every Friday night there was a dance next to the old Police Station. Guys in one corner girls in another, until someone broke the ice and then...???

It's amazing what changes a year makes. Things were not the same the summer of 1956. Some guys got day jobs, so the group thinned out until late afternoon, or early evening. And, instead of "talking" about girls and cars a few had girlfriends and wheels. Me? I had a girlfriend but no wheels. I could only use the family car, a '56 Chevy "occasionally." I did have a job though. I worked as a carhop at the Stewart's Root Beer Stand in Morgan. I liked that job, there was always something happening, especially on date nights, the weekend. And the tips were good. After the stand closed, between 11 and 12 depending on the business flow, and if I could not "bum" a ride home, I would walk and jog from Morgan to South Amboy. Why not hitchhike? There were very few cars on the road at that hour, and I did not mind walking or jogging. (Funny how age changes things, today I can't go from my house to the mailbox without getting tired). Sometimes I would stop at the Raritan Diner for a rest and to see what was "happening." And at that hour there were a few laughs to be had most of the time, especially on the weekends.

And they would continue to change from year to year until high school graduation, when most of us went our separate ways. The Smoke Column

Throughout the history of the fire service in the United States there have been some historic and notable fires. Some of these fires have changed the way fire departments conduct operations at fire scenes. Many of these fires are used as “learning tools” for fire officers and firefighters. Unfortunately, almost all these historic fires resulted in numerous deaths. Occasionally I will include one of these historic fires in the Smoke Column for information purposes and as a learning tool for the fire service.

Thirty-two years ago, on Friday, July 1, 1988 a fire erupted in the service area of the Hackensack Ford Dealership in Hackensack, NJ. Calls started coming into the dispatch center reporting flames and smoke coming from the roof of the structure. The entire Hackensack Fire Department, 100 firefighters, responded to the fire. The first arriving firefighters observed a heavy smoke condition at the roof area and began an investigation of the source from inside the building. For 20 minutes the suppression effort was concentrated on initial tactics, but little headway was made, and the fire continued to intensify inside the garage. It was at this point that the Incident Commander ordered an evacuation of all firefighters from the interior. There were currently nine firefighters inside. Suddenly and unexpectedly, a 60 foot square section of the building’s wood bowstring truss roof collapsed. Four firefighters were able to escape, three others were killed instantly. Two other firefighters attempted to seek refuge in a tool room where they spent the next 13 minutes calling for help. They were found 90 minutes later, deceased.

This fire was significant because it was one of the first devastating fires involving a bowstring truss roof structure in New Jersey with a loss of five firefighters. These types of roofs are common in bowling alleys, supermarkets, car dealerships, and anywhere there is a large open area unimpeded by columns or other roof supports. The original Incident Commander surveyed the roof upon arrival and thought it was a steel truss

roof which would have allowed for more time inside the garage. Unable to see the underside of the roof in the service area due to it being covered up, no one realized that it was a wooden truss constructed roof support system and once it started burning, would pose an early and tragic collapse. This type of truss construction is very strong because of its triangular design and will support the weight of a roof and equipment on it. Fires in this type of construction will burn fiercely and quickly leaving very little time to save a building once the fire gets started. When one truss fails due to fire destroying the triangular supporting web, all the trusses will begin to fail because they are engineered to work together as support structures. What was learned as a result of this tragedy? In most cases when a fire erupts in a truss constructed structure, fire fighters will go to a defensive operation and fight it from the outside. All buildings in the State of New Jersey having wooden truss construction must be identified. This is accomplished by mounting a red diamond shaped emblem/sign on the outside of the structure near the entrance. This red emblem will have either a “R”, “F”, or a “R/F” imprinted on it. This signifies that the building is constructed with trusses used in the “Roof”, “Floor, or used in both the “Roof and Floor”. This emblem is a reminder to incoming fire fighters that the structure is truss constructed, will burn rapidly, and is unsafe to enter if the interior is involved in fire. This does not in any way preclude these heroic firefighters from entering the structure to rescue trapped individuals but to serve as a warning to the possible dangers lurking inside.

With the 4th of July just around the corner, please be very careful when using any of the “so-called” legal fireworks that are available in our local stores. The wire from an ignited “Sparkler” can reach temperatures of over 1000 degrees and destroy human skin in an instant, especially the tender skin of a child. Even though they are legal, they are dangerous as soon as ignited and can cause severe injury or even death. BE CAREFUL!

War Hero

Since Memorial Day was last month, I thought I would honor my Uncle Ignatius Olejniczak (name also written Olenczak or Olencak). Many of our extended family does not realize that his mother Veronica, was a gold star mother.

Pictured above is her son, who was nicknamed "Patsy," who enlisted in the Army on October 12, 1915, after he just turned 21. While Europe was engaged in war in July 1914, the United States did not enter the war until April of 1917, after the ship RMS Luisitania was sunk, killing U.S. civilians.

When Patsy went overseas he was attached to the 1st Division Company D of the 28th Infantry Regiment. The 1st Division was the first to enter European soil on June 8, 2017. They repelled an advance by the Germans, which resulted in the turnaround of the war that ended October 12, 1918. The Division was known as the Black Lions of Cantigny.

Patsy was part of the Division that repelled the Germans in 1918 at the battle of Cantigny in the Second Battle of the Marne. Machine guns in WWI were responsible

for 20% of all casualties. While attacking the Germans, Patsy was killed by a machine gun bullet on July 21, 1918, just as his company was crossing the Paris-Soissons road south of Berzy-le-Sec. France. The war Department did not notify his family until several months after. They had him listed as severely wounded. He was buried on the spot, where he fell, by the regimental burial staff.

Patsy's body was finally returned to the U.S. from France on May 10, 1921, and was given full military honors and buried in his final resting place at Sacred Heart Church Cemetery, Parlin, NJ in the family plot. Patsy earned a Silver Star.

I did not want his sacrifice to go unnoticed on this day.

LITTLE RICHARD PERFORMS IN SOUTH AMBOY IN 1966-Part 2

The night of his performance I was there early. This was strange in itself because as any experienced night club devotee knows, there is always an early cheap bar you go to first, to get tuned up before you go to the party bar. However, this was not the night for that type of frugality. I had been a fan of Little Richard since I was 12 years old in the 7th grade at St Mary's, and heard Tutti Frutti come out of Biff McKeon's car radio as he and George Daly drove us down to St Catherine's in Spring Lake for a Grammar School basketball game. Little Richard's early songs were always the peak for me, and I was not going to miss a minute of his performance.

As luck would have it, it was a terrible night weather wise for bar hopping. Because of frozen rain and sleet, the roads were horrible, which for me meant the terrible realization that there was not going to be a big crowd for the performance! But, slow night or not the show started at exactly 10 pm. First, The Upsetters, Little Richard's 7- piece band with horns and guitars, and bass and rhythm played with no vocalists and filled the place with rhythm. Then a Sam and Dave type of duo sang a couple of songs. Next, a very healthy, robust girl singer sang some Memphis Soul, and then the stage went completely dark. When the lights came on there he was! Little Richard in all his glory. A tall drag queen with his layered on Max Factor #9 makeup, form fitting sequin purple jumpsuit, purple sequin slippers to match, and lacquered, pomaded hair swept high on his head with a matching sequined purple headband around his sweaty brow. But, no! The Colonel Cooper's crowd was having none of it!

At first there was complete silence. Then it started. Some boos and then some catcalls and insults came raining down on him. Loud. Louder. Then the jeers turned to name calling and more insults. So bad that I thought the next thing was going to be some beer bottles being thrown up at him. All of it was about his appearance, of course. The guys in this place were there to pick up girls, not be entertained by a guy who looked like one. I was mortified and heartbroken all at the

same time. There he was, my Little Richard being humiliated in my hometown.

Embarrassed by his reception and fearful for his safety, I was looking timidly now at the star himself for what his reaction would be to this uproar. Instead of a look of worry on his face, I saw the opposite. A look of unbelievable calmness. At that time I didn't recognize that look at all, but I've seen it since then a few times on masterful doctors, teachers, coaches and Army Sergeants. It is the look of ineffable confidence that comes from experience and competence. Right in the middle of all this clamor Little Richard strode to the front of the stage made eye contact with the biggest, loudest and meanest looking boosers and jeerers in the crowd and hollered, "Shut Up!" Then he cooed, "I know what you're thinking, but you're wrong! I'm married. Just the other day I said to my wife, I said, RALPH!" And his self deprecating humor instantly won over the clamoring crowd.

The whole place, including Little Richard, burst out laughing and immediately his band broke one of his most popular songs, "Lucille" and the crowd was now with him all the way. At once the focus was not on the performer's dainty appearance, but on the rocking music coming from his band. You'll have to take it from me, but the whole floor was shaking with the hitherto tough guys jumping up and down to the rhythmic, thumping, manic sounds his rocking piano and his band were pumping out. At the end, the same people who wanted his head on a platter when he started the show, were now begging him to do one more song.

Little Richard is gone now you'll be seeing some clips of him on TV and people will be making comments about his goofy appearance or over the top persona, especially how bizarre it was way back in the straight laced 50's. But now when you see him, look a little deeper into those made up eyes and remember this story and see if you can look past all that glitter and see the huge-hearted showman who demonstrated what courage and pride in a performance are all about on a little stage in good old South Amboy, New Jersey way back when!



Exercise and Osteoporosis

24 million Americans suffer from various forms of Osteoporosis. It is the most common disorder of the skeleton. Osteoporosis is the reduction in the amount of bone mass and demineralization leading to fractures after minimal trauma.

The signs of Osteoporosis are;

- a. Gradual loss of height
- b. Curvature of the Thoracic spine

Salt Water
Fluke have arrived but fishing for them in Raritan Bay is slow and not too many keepers. It is better in Barnegat Bay and Inlet where there are many more keepers over 18 inches. Bluefish are present here and also in the surf in this area. Bigger Bluefish are also showing up and at Island Beach. Surf fishing has produced a few Striped Bass and some unusual junk fish like Skates and Dog Fish. There is a good showing of King Fish from Island Beach southward. Short Stripers are still being caught in Raritan Bay particularly at Ideal Beach and Keansburg, but that will stop with the warm water coming in. Sea Bass fishing on the Party Boats is good with just about everyone coming off with their 10 fish limits. Ling and a stray Cod or two are mixed in along with a few big Porgies. Due to Covid-19 regulations, the boats are limited to a certain number of anglers, so it means you pay more money, purchase tickets online and wear a mask or face covering or else you will be denied boarding.

Fresh Water
Trout are still around. My wife and I tried the Pequest on Memorial Day. We caught five fish up to 14 inches. The following week we went to Peapack Brook. I saw and missed small natural Browns on a lure. We ended up at the North Branch at Far Hills. We brought home six Rainbows, me with two and my wife with four. One of hers was just short of 16 inches. A week later we went to Tilcon Lake but did nothing. The only catches we saw were a few Sunfish. There are less Shad in the Delaware.

WHAT IS IT? Winners

The correct answer was a car cigarette or cigar lighter. The original electrical cigar lighter was invented and patented in the early 1880s by the German inventor Friedrich Wilhelm Schindler. In the 1920s they were renamed "cigarette lighters", as cigarettes overtook cigars in sales. In the United States, cigarette lighters started appearing as standard equipment in automobiles in 1925-1926. In 1928, the Connecticut Automotive Specialty Company patented its version of an automotive cigarette lighter, which used a cord and reel. The modern "automatic" removable automotive V-Coil lighter was developed by Casco in 1956.

The lighter is a metal or plastic cylinder containing a thin flat coil of nichrome metal strip, through which high current passes when the device is activated, usually by pushing it into the socket as though it were a push-button. The heating element glows orange hot in seconds then it can light a cigarette or cigar. As cigarette smoking became less popular- you could choose to eliminate it in your car. Within the last 20 years the ports were used as a charging port for cellular phones. Currently they are no longer included in new cars.



50th Anniversary: Sayreville Captured Central Jersey Group IV Title

The Sayreville Bombers under legendary baseball coaching-genius, John Wortley had high expectations coming into the 1970 season, after a standout '69 campaign, when the team finished (20-7), and copped the Middlesex County Coaches Association Baseball Tournament (MCCABT). Returning 6 of the 9 Opening Day starters from 1969, Sayreville was ready to continue its assault on all opponents.

The starting lineup for their season-opener against Perth Amboy St. Mary's: Rick Popowski cf Dan Hockenjos ss Joe Gabel 3b Rich Lerche rf Kevin Lynch p Jim Campion 1b Bruce Buckiewicz lf Gary Unkel c Bob Casazza 2b. It was a game to remember, as Sayreville's senior ace Kevin Lynch fired an incredible no-hitter, and struck out 14 to lead the locals to a 4-0 victory over the Lions. Lynch struck out the first 6 batters he faced. Tony Mancini belted an RBI double, Joe Gabel stroked an RBI single, Gary Unkel added an RBI, and Jim Campion unloaded a three-base hit. This was just the beginning for Sayreville, who featured possibly the best 3-man starting pitching rotation in the school's history, Lynch, Greg Lyon, and Mike Drahos, (A transfer from St. Mary's, where he pitched for the '69 champs).

After being shocked by a strong St. Peter's team in their second game, the Bombers behind another no-hitter, this time by lefty Greg Lyon, throttled Matawan, 9-0. Lyon struck out 9 and also drilled an RBI double. Jim Campion belted a double and had 2 RBI, while George Olszewski stroked a 2-run single. This was the beginning of an amazing 14-game winning streak for Sayreville, which was stopped, one short of the school record, by New Brunswick, who tied the Blue & Gray in 8 innings in a game halted by rain.

Sayreville the defending (MCCABT champs) was seeded #1 in the '70 tourney, and in the 1st round, annihilated St. Mary's Perth Amboy, 28-2. In the quarterfinals facing #8 seed, St. Peter's, Coach Wortley's charges were stopped, 4-1 by the always tough Cardinals. The Bombers were then seeded #2 in the most prestigious tournament in NJ, the Greater Newark Tournament (GNT), and rode a beautiful 3-hit, 15-strikeouts shutout by Kevin Lynch, to top Morris Catholic in the opening round. Sayreville was eliminated 5-4 in the 1/4 finals by Columbia, who scored 3 runs in the bottom of the 7th inning. Rich Lerche orbited a 2-run triple, Jim Campion an RBI double, and Rick Popowski an RBI single for the locals.

The Bombers bounced back and blasted Woodbridge, 11-1 in the CJ Group IV semifinals, behind talented righthander Mike Drahos, who fired a 4-hitter, to seal Coach Wortley's 200th win in his illustrious coaching career. Kevin Lynch had a huge game at the plate, going 4-for-4 with 2 singles, 2 triples, and 3 RBI, Gary Unkel had 2 hits, while Rick Popowski, Dan Hockenjos, and Bob Casazza each stroked RBI singles.

In the CJ Group IV championship game

Sayreville (21-4-1) scored all of their runs in the 3rd inning to defeat a highly-regarded Union (26-4), 4-0. Union's standout pitcher, Neal Gold (13-0), was regarded by many as the top pitcher in all of NJ. Bomber ace Kevin Lynch was outstanding once again, firing a 4-hitter and striking out 7 for the big "W." He also drove in the first run with a single. Power-hitting Joe Gabel blasted a 2-run triple to left-center, and scored the final run on a perfectly executed squeeze bunt by Jim Campion, as Sayreville brought home the highly-coveted CJ Group IV championship trophy. It was the perfect ending for Coach John Wortley in his 13th and final season, as the club finished with one of the best records in school history (22-4-1). Wortley racked up an outstanding career record of (201-82-2).

Coach Wortley praised Lynch and Unkel after the final game. "Lynch is a real complete player." "Unkel is the best handler of pitchers that I ever had. It's like having a coach right on the field all the time. He has a strong throwing arm and the ability to call a shrewd game."

Coach Wortley was selected 1st Team Coach for the New York Daily News All-Stars, and catcher Gary Unkel was also a 1st Team selection...1st Team All-Sentinel (Predecessor to The Suburban)-ss-Dan Hockenjos; of-Rich Lerche; c-Gary Unkel; p-Kevin Lynch, Greg Lyon; Coach of the Year-John Wortley. Star Ledger All-Middlesex 1st Team-Lynch, Unkel. Home News All-Middlesex 1st Team-Lynch, Unkel. Star Ledger All-State, All-Groups-1st team-Lynch.

The Bombers 3-man starting rotation was phenomenal. Check out the stats: Kevin Lynch (9-1) IP-72 ER-10 ERA-0.97 H-38 SO-108 BB-17. Also notched 6 shutouts, (#1 in the county), and fired a no-hitter. Greg Lyon (6-1) IP 44 ER-6 ERA-0.95 H-20. Also fired 2 no-hitters. #3 starter Mike Drahos (5-2) with a 1-hitter...Joe Gabel tied for the county lead with 6 triples...Lynch led the team with 6 doubles...Popowski had the most homers for Sayreville (2)... Mike Drahos is most likely the only player ever to play on 2 state championship teams in 2 years at different high schools. In '69 he was pitching for the St. Mary's Eagles Parochial B state champs, and in '70 with the Sayreville Bombers. Quite an accomplishment!

John Andl a solo home run...1982-Hoffman downed Dunellen, 9-2 as John "Skeets" Skarzynski notched the victory. The top batting averages for the season were: Brian Seres .500 Nick Scarillo .491 Joe Bartlinski .421 Joe Magnifico .416.

1976-St. Mary's girls softball squad blasted Roselle Catholic, 32-9. Winning pitcher Sue Wilson crunched 3 home runs, a double and triple to drive in an unbelievable 10 runs. Kathy Redling unloaded 2 round trippers, and Linda Budrewicz, Tina Alvarado, and Diane Klein blasted a homer apiece. Also in '76, the Sayreville girls powerhouse, annihilated New Brunswick 33-1, as undefeated Karen DeSiena and Debbie Spitzer combined for a no-hitter. The Bombers blasted 7 home runs by Sharon Denk, Rhonda Rompola, Deb Szymanski, Lee Szatkowski, Donna Hauser, Melinda McFadden, Barb Hennessey. 
high gear and obliterated Highland Park, by would you believe a 44-2 score! Coach Pat Willis' club was paced by Rhonda Rompola who blasted 3 homers and had 7 RBI, Lu Ann Ferenci 5 RBI, and a homer, Sharon Denk 5 RBI, and a HR, and Janet Murray 5 RBI. 1977-St. Mary's pounded Roselle, 25-11. Winning pitcher Kathy Redling clouted 3 HR's, a 3-run, grand slam, and 2-run homer for 9 RBI. Ann Noble added a solo HR. Also in '77, the Saints destroyed Dunellen, 26-4, behind Redling's 2 homers, 3 doubles, a single and 5 RBI. Sue Wilson was the winning pitcher. The slugger orbited a 3-run HR in the 1st inning, a grand salami in the 4th, and a 2-run shot in the 7th, and also pounded 2 doubles for good measure, finishing a perfect 5-for-5.

And the biggest blowout in local high school girls softball history?

April 12, 1984-Coach Rich Klein's powerhouse Hoffman softball squad pounded Piscataway Tech, 52-2! Wow! The talented Lady Governors went on to win the Middlesex County championship, and finished at an overall (23-2). No individual information could be found on this ballgame.

15 Years Ago Guvs Set Records

2005-Coach George Krzyzanowski's outstanding South Amboy Governors baseball team went on a hitting rampage, and annihilated St. Peter's, 44-3! Several single game records were established, including the individual RBI mark, as Brian Seres hit for the cycle and drove in 9 runs to break the 60-year mark of 7 RBI, set by Jim Croddick in 1945. Brian Wanko also blasted a homer and finished with 8 RBI in the game. New team highs were set for runs (44), hits (35), and runs scored in 1-inning (17).



1970-Kevin Lynch, the Bombers ace pitcher finished (9-1), and in 72 innings, allowed only 10 earned runs-0.95 ERA, only 38 hits, struck out 108, walked only 17, fired 6 shutouts which was #1 in the county, and spun a no-hitter. He was All-Everything, and All-State All Groups 1st Team, and one of the greatest pitchers in Sayreville Bombers baseball history.



For the past several months with the help of the Middlesex County Office of Community Services, my administration has been making efforts to encourage each household in our community to complete their 2020 US Census Questionnaire.
