C-Town Destroyed By Fire

The C-Town supermarket on Bordentown Ave. in South Amboy was hit by its second fire since January, but this time, the building was totally demolished in a blaze that sent thick black smoke over much of the City of South Amboy during the two-hour inferno. Firefighters from South Amboy, Sayreville, Laurence Harbor and other parts of Middlesex and Monmouth counties bravely battled the huge blaze, which was fueled by a 20 m.p.h. wind, but was under control at 7 p.m. A South Amboy firefighter suffered heat exhaustion, was treated at the hospital, and released.

C-Town suffered damage in January when a fire began in the attic, caused by an electrical short in the wiring, according to officials. The store had been closed at the time, with no injuries, and the fire was ruled accidental.

C-Town opened in 2013 in South Amboy, following the longtime landmark, South Amboy Foodtown, which started in 1966. The late Frank Paczkowski started the original Frank's Meat Market, 87 years ago. His son Ed Paczkowski is the owner, and had run Foodtown until Hurricane Sandy and the economy were too much to overcome, as the store lost \$200,000 worth of perishables because the store had gone 15 days without power, and was reimbursed only \$50,000. Sadly the business was closed in 2012, but in 2013, Paczkowski leased the store to Nasser Nasser, who presently operated C-Town. Ed Paczkowski was devastated by the loss of the business that was so important to the Paczkowski family, but locals are hoping that it will be rebuilt in the future. When reached for a comment Ed said that, "Our family is heartbroken. The business was started by my father back in 1928. We've always been treated well by the people and the local towns, and we're sorry this happened. We certainly didn't want it to. Right now, we're concerned with getting the property cleaned and then we'll see where we stand."

Demolition/cleanup of the building's remains is currently underway.

Middlesex County Water Company employees worked throughout the day and night to stabilize the ground around Gordon St. March 24. The street collapse at the end of Gordon St. was originally reported as a sinkhole that swallowed up a car and forced the evacuation of three homes. South Amboy Fire Chief Mike Geraltowski said the hole was filled with rock, dirt and other objects. He said a new retaining wall will stabilze the road area and prevent further erosion. Geraltowski said the road collapse was caused by a water main break which loosened the soil. Geraltowski said it was lucky the street collapse occurred when it did, since the Gordon St. area was used as a staging area for the city's St. Patrick's Day parade two days earlier. Mike Quirk: On The Rise As A Professional Actor

Former South Amboy resident Mike Quirk is doing very well with his acting career in California. His most recent project "Warigami" is an action web-series for New Form Digital, set in a world where some people can fold paper into deadly weapons. New Form Digital was created by Discovery, Ron Howard and Bryan Grazer, and creates scripted digital content. Mike said that, "We hope to see episodes of "Warigami" available for the public by the end of the year." You can currently see Mike in a series of commercials for Salonpas; they are airing on a number of channels daily. He also just shot a regional commercial which will be airing in 5 states including Florida and California. Quirk has also appeared in a number of industrials, which are videos produced by a corporation for use inside that corporation, for example: sales videos, training videos, conference videos. He said that, "I am presently working on a series of industrials for KPMG, and just shot another for Chase."

Mike moved to Los Angeles 2 years ago, and most of the work he's done has been in California. "I've been sent as far south as San Diego and as far north as Saint Luis Obispo for a shoot. I've also worked on a couple of famous movie ranches here in southern California. The farthest I have been sent is Las Vegas. I shot the concert opener for Toby Keith's Shut Up and Hold Or tour. I spent 3 days shooting at the Rio in Las Vegas, and the surrounding desert with Toby Keith, Carrot Top and Michael Bailey Smith."

Mike and his wife Lauren have their own show called "Meet The Quirks, which they have written, and Lauren has directed, as they play caricatures of themselves in this great shorts show. Mike directed a few, and edited almost all of them. Quirk said that, "The show is a passion project for me and Lauren. We wanted to have the experience of producing our own content. Producing is a big job, especially when you're wearing $many\,different\,hats.\,\,We\,were\,actors, produc$ ers, writers, directors, plus any number of the hundreds of other jobs on a film shoot, such as director of photography, script supervisor, lighting technician, catering. We were very busy! If we decide to have to continue to shoot new episodes of "Meet The Quirks," we will be sure to have a much larger crew." Mike's wife Lauren was raised in Oakland, NJ and attended Washington and Lee University in Lexington, VA, and has been singing and acting since graduating. "We met in May of 2008, and will celebrate our 4th wedding anniversary on May 21st." Mike graduated from Hoffman HS in 1995, and recalled "The thing I remember most about those days was how close everyone was. Coming from a small school in a small town, everyone knew each other and most people had the opportunity to try a number of different things. It wasn't odd for someone to be a soccer player or softball player and in a musical, or be on student government, and be a star on the basketball court."

Quirk said that, "I never thought I wanted to be an actor. I know I enjoyed acting and performing in the band and chorus, and in Tony G's Lyp Sync contests in high

school. I continued acting in college and in community theater, then I spent a number of years as an on-air talent in radio, but it wasn't until I decided to move to New York City and pursue my voice over career that I really thought that I could be an actor. It's the kind of thing that I just did. It was part of who I was. I remember Mrs. McDonnell saying to us in gym class one day, "It's hard enough to get up and go to work every morning, you better be sure you like what you're doing." I'm thankful every day, and sometimes a little surprised, that I get to wake up and do what I love to do."

During his first year of college, he took a professional training course for broadcasting (radio and TV), and that helped him get an internship at a radio station. He said, "I spent the next few years working in radio, while completing my degree in Communications. I produced a number of shows, worked on air, and planned and executed more events and contests than I can count. I left radio because emerging technology was making it possible for large companies to do more with less people for a smaller cost, so opportunities were limited. I had the good fortune to get hired as the Theater Arts teacher in Middlesex, NJ. I spent 8 years in Middlesex teaching Theater Arts in the Middle School and Audio/Video Production classes in the High School. I also directed a number of plays and musicals and worked closely with the High School's Robotics team. Plus, during those 14 or 15 years, I spent many a night rehearsing or performing in community theaters all over the Jersey Shore. I never thought that I would be an actor when I was growing up. This is my third career, and it took me a long time to get here, but now that I am here, I am very happy to call LA my home."

You can see Mike Quirk appearing in an episode of "My Crazy Ex" on Lifetime Movie Network (LMN); new episodes air Wednesdays at 9 p.m. Eastern on LMN. He will also be in the upcoming SyFy Channel feature "Flight WWII." Mike will play a history professor who uses his expertise to help guide his plane to safety after it is sent back to 1940. The trailer is available on Youtube.com, but release information is still forthcoming.

"My goal is to continue to be a working actor," said Quirk. "This is the best job I have ever had, and I want to do it for as long as I am able. I hope that means you will be seeing me on TV and in movies for a long time to come."

What advice would you give to a youngster who wants to be an actor someday? "Be a hard worker, learn all you can, and be a nice person. Making movies and TV shows is fun, but it is also a very slow moving and sometimes tedious process. The best way to get ahead is to be the type of person with whom other people are going to want to work with."

Mike has had some very memorable moments in his acting career including "Fighting with Don Quixote in the feature "Don Quixote: The Ingenious Gentleman of La Mancha;" chumming around with Toby Keith and Carrot Top while shooting Toby's "Shut Up and Hold On" tour movie; playing one of my favorite characters, Lt. Colombo, on stage; seeing a script that I wrote become



1967 Frog Hollow Tennis Tourney



Early South Amboy Basketball – Part II By Fran Fitzmorris

I will begin with updates to Part I of my article on the beginnings of basketball in South Amboy. I found the name of one of the two women who refereed as early as 1914. Her name was Dorothy Watts. The other update has to do with the basketball rules being used. The teams were playing under Amateur Association Union (AAU) rules. All teams were still playing in halls. Gymnasiums were still a ways away in the future. The South Amboy school district had to be creative to get basketball started. The school building was older and the people in charge of sports decided to turn one of the classrooms into a practice facility for both the girl's and boy's teams. I have a hard time picturing this as a viable solution. This was probably an issue in many of the schools. The South Amboy district had no other option. Eventually a new school was built on John Street.

Some of the young men who played for the town between 1912-1918 were Ulmer Burkhard, Milton Rice, W.Forgottson, Robert Kerr, Frank Grace and Harold Hoffman. Some of the women were Miss Newton, Miss Christy and Miss Thomas. There were many more young men and women involved but, obviously, too numerous to mention. These games were played in the Knights of Pythian Hall and Columbia Hall in town. There were no athletic directors as such. The scheduling of games and getting at least one referee was the job of the coach. He did everything.

During these early years, South Amboy played the following schools from Middlesex County-Metuchen, Jamesburg, South River, Perth Amboy, New Brunswick and Keyport. The remainder of the schedule was filled in with local amateur teams who probably wanted a "fee" in order to play the high school. On the other hand, little information was known about the "other" school in town, St. Mary's., before 1919.

St. Mary's opened their doors for the second time in 1893. It started out as a three year school and became a four year school in 1919. The school had three floors. The third floor or "the hall" was used for basketball. It's almost impossible to judge the enrollment. I'm sure they had a basketball team but received no ink in the local paper. It had to be difficult to run a sports' program only being a three year school until 1919.

World War I changed everything in South Amboy. The war took many of the seventeen and eighteen year olds to fight. Because of the war, both schools were left with only underclassmen for their sports' programs.

The 1918-1919 season was the first time that Middlesex County decided to honor the best high school team. The first team to win that award were the St. Mary's Juniors who finished with a 19-2 record. The team consisted of six players. They were led by my uncle John Fitzmorris, known for his ball-handling skills, George Moran, Delaney, Seagrave, Kennedy and Meacham. These six would play together for two more years and a Vail would be added and continue to do well with Charlie Eppinger as coach.

By 1922, South Amboy and St.Mary's were playing each other twice a year, three times, if the first two games were split in order to decide the city championship. Except for the years, 1933-1939, the two teams played each other every year into the 1990's.

1983 Tom Kelly Interview By Tom Burkard

In 1983, Tom Kelly, at 32 years old, became the youngest coach in the Major Leagues. The following was an interview I did with him prior to his departure for his first Spring Training with the Minnesota Twins as their third base coach.

TB: How does it feel to be going back to Minnesota?

TK: I'm looking forward to Spring Training at Orlando, Florida, and also returning to Minnesota for the first time since 1975. I hope the team can get off to a good start, and we can put more people in the stands than in the past. I hope I can contribute my knowledge and abilities in making them a good team.

TB: Will there be any players in Minnesota that you have managed in the minors?

TK: Frank Viola, Gary Gaetti, Brad Havens, Tim Laudner, and Randy Bush. There were also many others playing in the Florida Instructional League, which I was in charge of for the past 3 years. The League was in Clearwater, Florida, and ran from October through November.

TB: What was your biggest thrill as a baseball player?

TK: Getting called to the big leagues after so much time in the minors. Also, playing for the Twins against the Yankees in New York.


TB: What are your fondest memories of South Amboy?

TK: I remember that the Little League and Babe Ruth League were well run, and gave us plenty of opportunity to play.

TB: How do the Twins look this year?

TK: We need pitching. If the young guys come through and Castillo and Ron Davis do well in the bullpen, we could have a good year.

TB: Has owner Calvin Griffith changed

his low paying policy?

TK: Griffith has loosened up, but won't come up with big money. Why pay millions? Our farm system developed some good future players in Kent Hrbek and Gary Gaetti. We did not participate in the free agent draft, but will have to come up with big money to keep from losing our young stars in next year's free agent market.

TB: Do you miss being an active player?

TK: You get over it. I enjoy managing and coaching, because it is rewarding to teach, and then see progress. I can also relate my skills to younger players.

TB: What are some important differences in the minor and major league levels?

TK: In the majors, you fly in comfort, while in the minors you always ride on buses, and some trips can be very long. The big leagues offer more money and better health benefits.

to host the Raritan Bay fireworks. The first was in 2012 The two cities did not hold one in 2013 due to waterfront damage caused by Hurricane Sandy. Plans call for 1,750 luxury residential units, 88 affordable housing units, a restaurant, parking, an associated park, and associated commercial uses. The developer will also pay for the continuance of a waterfront parkway. Mayor Henry also praised city departments for their hard work. He congratulated the city department heads for their leadership. He also noted the Fire Department is celebrating its 125th anniversary this year with a parade in September. He also pointed out the library observed its 100th anniversary and was happy with the recent St. Patrick's Day parade which was well attended despite the change of date. .



Even though Elizabeth Taylor and her big screen counterparts like Audrey Hepburn, Marilyn Monroe, Sandra Dee, and Grace Kelly, are no longer with us, there are many beautiful actresses from the decade of the 1960's who are alive and well. Let's remember a few of the bottled blondes who had lit up the screen:

Yvette Mimeux was born in Los Angeles, California in 1942, and "in the business" until 1992. Always ladylike and reserved, Yvette had a starring role in the 1960's movie "Where the Boys Are," as well as, other films such as "The Time Machine," "Diamond Head," and "Toys in the Attic." After quitting her acting career at the age of 50, Yvette Mimeux became a real estate investor, a yoga devotee, and, surprisingly, an anthropologist.

Bridget Bardot, who was never described as being ladylike or reserved, was born in France in 1934 and "active" from 1952 to 1973. In 1952, "BB" married Roger Vadim, a screen writer, producer, director, "serial husband," and future mate of Jane Fonda. Bardot and Vadim remained together until divorcing in 1965. The Smoke Column By Ex-Chief Richard Kosmoski

"Mutual Aid" is a term that is heard of often and widely used throughout the fire service but what is it? Years ago, local fire departments handled most of their fire emergencies with the personnel and apparatus from within their own community. Additional manpower and equipment from neighboring communities was rarely requested except when a major conflagration occurred. Volunteer fire departments had an abundance of manpower available within their community to rely on in time of emergency. This was due to many local industries in the area having shift operations where their employees would work evenings or nights and be available during the day to answer fires. There was even a time when many of the "Main Street" businesses would allow their employees to leave work to answer fire calls during their working hours. Unfortunately both of these valuable resources have long gone by the wayside.

In the years preceding World War II, most if not all of the fire departments had a waiting list of prospective members to join. Some applicants had to wait many years before being allowed regular membership to the fire company. Those days too are long gone. There is probably not a single volunteer fire department that can say that they have a full quota of members and aren't accepting new members at this time. Recruiting new members and retaining current members is an ongoing process. Many fire departments offer incentives to new and existing members in the form of a program called Length of Service Award Program (LOSAP).

Fires that erupted years ago did not burn as hot or as fast as they do today and a rapid response by the fire department usually handled the incident. Construction and building materials were made from natural products such as thick milled lumber and the home furnishings were of cotton, wool, or real wood. Fires that erupt today usually require an immediate response with quick fire fighting actions to knock the fire down or bring it under control. Today the buildings are constructed of pressed and glued wood components and the furnishings are mostly made in some form of plastic, both of which burn with great intensity.

When a fire occurs during the daytime hours, a time when most volunteers are at work, manpower is limited. Fortunately, most of our fire departments have "Mutual Aid" agreements with their surrounding communities. These agreements allow neighboring fire departments to send additional manpower and equipment quickly to the scene of the incident when requested by the incident commander/fire chief.

Mutual Aid agreements can also be formed between communities and the county, between neighboring counties, and between states. Mutual Aid does not always have to be for firefighting, it can be used for any type of emergency. A lost or missing person, floods, a building collapse are but a few examples where mutual aid may be needed.

New Jersey received Mutual Aid from various states when hit with Hurricane Sandy. The State of Mississippi sent an experienced Incident Management Team (IMT) to Middlesex County because of the experience they aquired during Hurricane Katrina. This Team coordinated all county wide command operations for the month following Hurricane Sandy.

Having Mutual Aid agreements in effect provides a way for towns to prevent the duplication of equipment, which can be a cost saving benefit to the community and taxpayers. There is no reason to duplicate resources in neighboring towns if that equipment is rarely used and is of a specialized nature. It would be beneficial for neighboring towns to discuss their needs before purchasing expensive and unique equipment which can serve the needs of many communities during an emergency situation.

If a major catastrophic emergency occurs in Middlesex County, local communities can turn to the Middlesex County Fire Marshal's Office for assistance. Under the auspices of the County Fire Marshal, additional fire equipment from throughout Middlesex County can be sent to the scene of the incident. The County Fire Marshal is aware of the status of every piece of firefighting equipment in the county and its availability. He is able to provide additional resources and equipment from anywhere in the county rather than stripping equipment from the local communities surrounding the incident. He can also request additional resources from surrounding counties, if necessary, during an emergency situation.

Mutual Aid is a valuable resource that is now being used frequently throughout Middlesex County and is used well! It would be difficult to predict what would happen if it wasn't available.

Some commercial boats went far offshore to look for Mackerel but didn't find any.

My wife and I got a late start for opening day Trout and reached the Black River around noon. There were a lot of people there, some did very well and others didn't. Between there and Peapack Brook, we managed to catch three Rainbows and a native Brown which I released back. We did however on the following week on Sunday at the Pequest, catch 4 Rainbows with my wife bringing in a nice one at 20 inches and about 3 pounds. Shad are in the Delaware River and also being caught at the Water Gap. It's just getting started up at Lambertville and Easton, these being the best areas.

Richard Wojciechowicz (Sayreville) was a standout football player at Trenton State College in the 60's, and selected into the school's Athletic Hall of Fame. He was named Little All-American fullback, and also turned in one of the top punting averages in the country...Matt Ryan (St. Joseph's HS) played baseball for Belmont Abbey in 1990 and part of 1991, before attending Middlesex County College, where he helped lead the team to a national ranking in 1993. Matt was an All-Conference, All-Region outfield selection in 1992 and 1993...John Wojcik (Sayreville) led his Ramapo College team to 2 conference titles, and 2 NCAA appearances between 2003 and 2007. He has been the highly-successful basketball coach at

Sayreville HS for the past few years...Jeff Toth (Sayreville) was a NJCAA 1st Team All-American in 2006 while playing for Middlesex County College. He went on to star at The College of New Jersey from 2007-2009, and was a 3rd Team NCAA Division III All-American shortstop in '07. In '09, he was a finalist for NCAA Division III National Player of the Year, and finished 2nd place. Also, in 2009, he was #5 in the nation with a lofty .483 batting average. Jeff led the nation in defensive assists in 2007 with 172. His college career totals were: avg.-.414, home runs-24, triples-24, doubles-45, stolen bases-72. He holds the TCNJ career record with 15 triples. Jeff went on to play professional baseball for 2 seasons...

Favorite College Sports Memories

Bill D'Amico (Sayreville) played baseball at the U.S. Naval Academy Annapolis from 1974-77. He also played 2 years of soccer. Bill shared some of his fondest memories with us. "In my freshman year, I was called up to varsity at the end of the year. My claim to fame that year came against Army for the neutral game. We swept them during the regular season, which counts in the league standings. Back in the mid 70's, Army and Navy were part of the Ivy League. A separate game was played for the neutral match. Up to that point, there was never a 3-game sweep between the two academies during the season.

Although I was called up to varsity, I had no expectations of playing. Army was winning going into the 9th inning, but we rallied to tie the score at 8 with 2 runs on a 2 out double by our catcher Joe Zeni. He was not a strong runner, and they pinch ran for him. I was summoned from the bullpen to run, but when they told me to warm up, I thought to pitch, so I got onto the bullpen mound to warm up. They yelled at me to warm up my legs and not my arm. In I went to pinch run. Our next batter drove a single up the middle, and I was waved around to score. The throw beat me to the plate, but I bowled over the catcher and the collision jarred the ball loose. I was called safe, and became part of history for scoring the run that allowed a 3-game series season sweep by a service academy team for the first time in their history.

My biggest thrill turned out to be my biggest disappointment. At the start of my sophomore year, Coach Duff finally allowed me to pitch. He was not impressed by my performance during winter indoor practices, and during the beginning of spring outdoor practice. But, I was just one of three lefthanded pitchers, and did make the varsity squad. Initially, I came out of the pen, but a third of the way through the season, I got my first start, and pitched a complete game against the University of Pitt. I had a very strong sophomore year and tallied a 5-1 won/loss record heading into the final week of the season. The University of Penn finished the season with a (12-3) Ivy League record, and in the process, toppled 5-time Ivy League champion Harvard. But, we owned the tie-breaker, having beaten them early in the season. We entered the last weekend of the league season with a (9-3) record and had to win a single game against Dartmouth on a Friday, and a doubleheader sweep of Harvard Saturday, to match Penn's record. With the sweep, we would represent the Ivy League in the College World Series.

Against Dartmouth, Coach Duff pitched our captain and senior right-hander, Randy


Young. We won big against Dartmouth, having scored double digit runs thanks to a grand slam home run by my classmate Eddie Abner, and a two-run shot in the later innings. Senior lefty, Lou Repucci was picked by Coach Duff to start the first game on Saturday against Harvard, and I was scheduled to start the second game. Lou was superb as we beat Harvard, in a low-scoring game, either 2-0 or 3-1 in our favor. Our Ivy hopes came down to the final game. We fell behind early by a score of 2-1. Harvard got 2 runs off me without the benefit of a hit. My sudden wildness and faulty defense led to the 2 unearned runs. Heading into the next to the last inning, we were still behind 2-1, and I still had a no-hitter going. With one out, I walked a batter, and Harvard bunted him to second. I walked the next batter, to face their number 3 batter who was left-handed. I fell behind on the count 2-1 and then 3-1. Coach Duff came out and pulled me from the game. The relief pitcher completed the walk and now had to face their cleanup hitter, who was also left-handed. On the first pitch, he blasted a grand slam home run to make the score 6-1. We came back in the last inning to score 4 runs of our own, but fell one run short. We lost 6-5 and our chance to get into the College World Series. It was difficult for me at the time, because it was the first time I ever lost a game without giving up a hit. Six runs on one hit is rare, but it happens sometimes.

I did play 2 years of soccer, but realized that my talent level was nowhere near where it needed to be in order to compete on the Division I level. I focused on baseball my final two years."


Klimchak joins Ohio Machine

Walking For Your Good Health

Over the last quarter of a century the exercise field has experienced one craze after another. But only one activity - fitness walking - has shown steady growth and popularity.

Walking is a surprisingly effective strategy for lifelong health. It is accessible to almost everyone. You've done it all your life and you can continue to do it well into old age. Walking also delivers proven benefits to all of the body's major systems ... muscles, bones, heart and circulation. You can walk almost anywhere without special facilities or equipment. Studies show that walkers traveling faster than five miles an hour actually burn twice as many calories as runners going the same speed.

When you begin a walking program, keep in mind that you're in no big hurry. This is lifetime health, not overnight magic. At first, forget heart rates and stop watches. Just go walk at a comfortable pace slightly above a stroll.

You don't have to walk any particular way, but there comes a point when refinements offer definite benefits. The correct posture, arm swing and stride add up to higher intensity exercise and lower risk of injury.

Posture – when walking, lean slightly forward, from the ankles, not the waist. Leaning from the waist will only tire your back and make breathing harder. Keep your head level and your chin up.

Arm swing – keep your elbows firmly bent at a 90-degree angle, and swing your arms from the shoulder. Your hand should end its forward swing at breastbone height. On the backswing, if you're moving fast, the upper arm is almost parallel to the ground.

Stride - make your stride long and smooth. Borrow some moves from competitive race walkers: keep your supporting leg straight as your body passes over it, and let the hip rise and relax. As the leg moves to the rear, keep its foot on the ground as long as possible before pushing off.

Remember – the proper technique is not as important as getting out there and doing something. Keep in mind that healthy people are well overall; their activities help fend off heart disease and circulatory problems. The key is to stay active.

Keep it up – to make walking a habit, takes will power and sometimes a strategy. Schedule regular walks with a friend if you need an extra push, or walk first thing in the morning before other commitments crop up, or vary your routine to keep it interesting or get a dog!

Finally, try not to think of it as exercise. It's time you've set aside for yourself.

My Hometown, South Amboy By John Phillips

God willing, I plan to write several stories about my growing up years in this Pleasant Little City. As I look back at those days from where I am today, I smile and wonder where the time went. However, before we get to my stories I want to tell you a little about the history of this little town and the part it played in the history of our state and country.

Today South Amboy is a mile square. Back in the 1800's it was much larger. It once extended as far as Cranberry and to the border of Monmouth County. It was a sprawling township of eighteen miles long and six miles wide.

The town grew out of the city across the Raritan Bay, Perth Amboy. Perth Amboy was a colonial port and the first capital of the area called East Jersey. It eventually became the capital of the Jersey colony until the 1776 Revolution. William Franklin was the last royal governor. He was also the estranged son of Benjamin Franklin. The area across the bay was called the South Ward of Perth Amboy and hence the name when it separated from Perth Amboy. South Amboy was a perfect connecting point for the travel from New York to Philadelphia. A ferry connected the Amboys to the long stagecoach road from South Amboy to Bordentown, the stagecoach road that continued the long journey to Philadelphia. That road still exists today and is called Bordentown Avenue. It begins at the water's edge of Raritan Bay and continues through the city on its way across the state.

Back in the colonial days the travel from New York City to Philadelphia took around five days. South Amboy was a perfect spot to rest and relax prior to continuing the journey. So, several hotels sprang up, and taverns for "socializing; thus began the long tradition of taverns in the city. In my day there were about 40!

During the Revolution it is reported that the town was used as a lookout for British ships in the bay, at that time called Amboy Bay. An important early resident was Major General James Morgan who was on Washington's staff and was responsible for patrolling and protecting the area. He is buried in the family cemetery on a hilltop overlooking a picturesque view of Raritan Bay. A section of the town is called Morgan

South Amboy's economy was always directed to shipping, fishing and manufacturing. It had big clay deposits and a profitable pottery and terra cotta industry developed. There were once three terra cotta and pottery factories in town. I remember exploring the abandoned factories as a kid and finding pottery items that were still useable.

However, it was the railroad that was to become the greatest factor in the city's growth and development. The Stevens family owned property in both Perth and South Amboy. They would later settle in Hoboken where they founded Stevens Institute of Technology. John Stevens brought the first steam engine (the John Bull) made in England to New Jersey. His sons founded the Camden & Amboy Rail Road in 1831. Here again South Amboy's unique location became very important as the rail line followed the old stagecoach route. The Camden & Amboy railroad was the first of several railroads that passed through the city. Later there would be many: The New York & Long Branch, The Raritan River, Jersey Central, and of course, The Pennsylvania Railroad. The train whistles were heard throughout the day when I was growing up. Many of those trains brought coal from the Pennsylvania coalfields to be unloaded into barges for transport to New York City and power plants along the northeast coast. However, there were other types of goods transported to the city for further water distribution. One of these was military explosives that led to one of the major disasters the town experienced.

It happened on May 19, 1950, at the coal docks. Explosives (land mines) were being loaded onto barges for transport to a larger ship in the bay when something went wrong. Thirty-one loaders were killed and debris was blown on the streets near the waterfront, and just about every window in town was blown out and many people were injured. The National Guard came into town that night to protect property and help restore calm. I lived on the waterfront and will remember that day for the rest of my life. My friend "Tank" Leonard and I were playing stickball down by the water when a large orange ball started to rise in the sky. We stood there looking at it with awe and wonder. Then the ground started to shake and a tremendous roar followed. I remember people coming out of their houses in shock and many were bleeding from the windows that shattered in their homes. Our house was a mess: there were no windows and the floor had caved in. We spent the next several days with relatives whose home did not suffer the damage that the waterfront houses did. I was not injured, but my brother and mother were. A plate glass window at a candy shop got my brother, and my mother was hit by flying can goods at the grocery store. My dad, who had a few Jameson's in him, slept through the whole thing. When he woke up, he asked: "What the hell happened?"

I could go on, but I think you have a pretty good picture of the town I was born and raised in. Now some lighter stuff!

A sample of some of our notable people:

Let's start with Harold G Hoffman, the 41st governor of New Jersey from 1934 to 1938. He enlisted as a private in World War I and served overseas rising to a captain and eventually a full colonel. While he was governor, he was fully involved in the Lindberg kidnapping case. He strongly felt that Bruno Hauptmann was innocent of the kidnapping and murder of the Lindberg child and did everything he could to commute the death sentence. He was unsuccessful and some say that was the end of his political career. However, to me his most important achievement was getting my father back into the country after he was deported for jumping ship. Except for him, I might not have come along!

For its size South Amboy was well represented in major league baseball:

Allie Clark played for the New York Yankees, Cleveland Indians, Philadelphia Athletics, and Chicago White Sox. He was a teammate of many famous players and had two World Series rings: 1947 with the Yankees, and 1948 with the Cleveland Indians. During the off-season he had a tavern called The Sportsman's Inn, and many of his big league friends would visit. I pestered him into giving me a Cleveland Indian hat. I had to fill it with paper to make it fit. He was a nice man who always had time for the kids. He died in 2012.

The O'Brian twins (Johnny and Eddie) put my high school -- St. Mary's -- on the map. They were outstanding basketball and baseball players. They got scholarships to Seattle University and put that school on the map. Johnny, only about five ten, scored 43 points against the Harlem Globetrotters in 1952. They were very instrumental in convincing Elgin Baylor to attend Seattle University. Both were All American basketball and baseball players. Bing Crosby, then a part owner of the Pittsburgh Pirates, signed them to a "Bonus Baby" contract. They were the first twins to play in the same game in major league history. And they were only one of four brothers in major league history to play second base and shortstop in the same game. They played for the Pittsburgh Pirates, St. Louis Cardinals and Milwaukee Braves. After they left baseball, they returned to Seattle and had very distinguished careers. Eddie died in 2014.

John (Jack) McKeon, famously known as "Trader Jack," had a long distinguished career as a major league executive and manager. He managed: The Kansas City Royals, Oakland Athletics, San Diego Padres, Cincinnati Reds and finally the 2003 Miami Marlins when they won the World Series. He was also the General Manager

of the National League Pennant-winning Padres of 1986. There will be more about "butts" -- that's what we called him because he always had a cigar in his mouth. He was my first basketball coach in grammar school; and he was funny even back then. Oh, at the age of eighty he was the oldest major league manager since Connie Mack. Jack was also a graduate of St Mary's High School and was a teammate of the O'Brien twins on both the school's baseball and basketball teams.

Thomas (Tommy) Kelly was also a St. Mary's graduate. He was an All State baseball player and was signed by the Seattle Pilots. He eventually made the majors with the Minnesota Twins, but his real accomplishments were managing at the major league level. He managed the Twins from 1986 to 2001 and won two World Series. In 2012 the Twins retired his uniform number 10, and he is currently a special advisor to the team's general manager. I remember him as a nice kid who lived around the corner from my mother.

Finally, do you remember the Milton Berle show? I think it was on TV every

Tuesday night and was called the Texaco Star Theatre. If you do, do you remember the act when Uncle Miltie would yell for makeup and a tubby little guy, dressed in a funny costume, would run out onto the stage and smack him in the face with a large makeup pad? Well that tubby little guy's name was Marco Marcello and he was from South Amboy. He was a town celebrity and drove around in a big black Buick, and always dressed to the nines. He had a favorite tavern on Broadway and sometimes on a Saturday evening you could hear him belt out a lovely Italian song. He had a beautiful tenor voice.

Well, this is the end of "My Home Town Story". South Amboy was, and probably still is, on balance a "blue collar" town. As I remember, all religions were active. This small town had a lot of churches and an active synagogue. There is much more I could add, but I would be writing non-stop. I hope to add more stories in future Link editions to tell what it was like growing up in South Amboy, my hometown.
