John (Jack) T. O'Leary, Sr. Remembered

John (Jack) T. O'Leary, Sr., 96, of South Amboy passed away on Tuesday April 6, 2021. He died peacefully at home surrounded by his children and grandchildren. Jack was born on February 17, 1925 and he was a lifelong resident of South Amboy. He started working with his Uncle John Dooling at the age of 11 and quickly learned the electrical trade. On June 29, 1942 at the age of 16 he joined the Navy (with some finagling) and served in WWII aboard the USS Admiral RE Coontz AP-122. During the war he became a member of the "Domain of the Golden Dragon," an unofficial but highly coveted award of the US Navy. He joined the South Amboy Police Department in 1955 and served 35 years before retiring. During this time and long after retiring from the SAPD he continued his work as an electrician and became owner of Dooling Electric. Jack is a member of St. Mary's R.C. Church, South Amboy, an honorary life member of the South Amboy Knights of Columbus Council 426, a member of the American Legion Luke A. Lovely Post 62, South Amboy, VFW Post 335 Cranford and a charter member of the South Amboy Ancient Order of Hibernians where he was honored as Hibernian of the Year in 1998. He served as Grand Marshal of the South Amboy St. Patrick's Day Parade in 2002, received the Blue Badge Award from his peers for saving a life in 1972, a life member of the Protection Fire Dept. in South Amboy, a member of the South Amboy PBA Local 63, and NJ State PBA, Retired Local 600.

Jack was very proud of his Irish heritage. He enjoyed his horses and bringing out the sled or carriage for a turn around town. He was sometimes spotted at a local tavern bringing the pony in for refreshments. Jack always enjoyed a good joke but most of all telling one. He loved to be with family and was always up for a picnic, reunion or gathering of friends. He was a strong patriarch of his family, a good friend to all, a man who would give his shirt for a friend.

He was a good father who always took care of his children and did the best he could to teach and guide them, a loving grandfather and great-grandfather.

Jack was a strong, proud and good man. He is loved and will be missed by many!

premium for your home-owners insurance policy? Do neighboring communities have different rates? Why is the premium different for the exact same home but in different communities? The answers to these questions can be summed up with what is called the "ISO Rating".

Your home-owners insurance premium is based on the Insurance Service Office (ISO) rating for each community and all have variables. ISO creates ratings for your local fire department. Your local ISO fire score is a rating that determines how well your local fire department can protect your community and home. Insurance companies use this score to help set home insurance rates, as a home that is less likely to be severely damaged or destroyed by fire is cheaper to insure. ISO does not officially release scores, so it is not the availability of the water supply including easy to look up your area's score or how it's impacting your insurance rates.

Your fire department has the greatest impact on determining the ISO rating for your town and every structure in it. The more well equipped your fire department is to put out a fire, the less likely your house is to burn down. And that makes your home less risky, and therefore less expensive to insure. An ISO fire insurance rating is a score from 1 to 10 and indicates how well protected your community is by the fire department. A score of 1 is the best possible while a score of 10 means the fire department did not meet the ISO's minimum requirements. Less than 1% of the fire departments have a fire rating of 1, while the most common rating for fire departments is a 5. According to the ISO's Fire Suppression Rating Schedule (FSRS),

What determines the amount of the including available staffing levels, training, and proximity of the firehouse. Are there always enough firefighters available to respond 24/7? Mutual aid from a surrounding community does not play into the rating score. All firefighters must be trained and certified to a specific level to be counted in the staffing quota. Firefighters must have up-to-date PPE and it must be in good condition. Fire apparatus, pumps, ladders, and other various equipment must be tested and certified annually to qualify in the rating. Training records must be up-to-date, and all mandatory training documented. All fire hose must be tested and documented annually so that it should not burst when pressurized with water. Any area in the community that is 5 miles from a firehouse is automatically rated a "10". 40% of the rating comes from the prevalence of fire hydrants and how much water is available for putting out a fire. If a water main bursts, is there still an adequate supply of water to fight a fire if needed? 10% of the rating is determined by the quality of the emergency communication system and the various devices used to alert firefighters when an emergency occurs. It is all about getting well trained firefighters to the scene of an emergency quickly and with the proper equipment necessary. Home-owner insurance companies offer lower rates if you have a lower ISO rating because a well-prepared fire department should be able to put out your home's fire more quickly. With that said, when your fire department is looking to upgrade apparatus or purchase new fire fighting equipment and tools, it would be

Imagine the whole room singing along with Little Richard, a real Slop Chute Sing Along! After a few beers, some guys would go on to the open floor to do a little "dancing," yes dancing, if you wanted to call it that. A sight to see! Remember the 1957s song: "The Stroll" by The Diamonds? And the way teenagers did couple of parachutes to float down over the the dance on American Bandstand? Picture young Marines singing "let's go strolling" as they strolled up and down the line after a couple of liquid refreshments. Another sight to see. Around 9:15 or 9:30 PM the lights would blink telling us it was closing time. If there for. Pretty cool!

you wanted another beer, you'd better hurry. Then it was hurry back to the barracks before lights out at 10PM.

The Parachute Story:

After 13 weeks of Boot Camp and then Force (FMF) reported to our new home. Camp Lejeune North Carolina. After getting settled, a couple of us newcomers decided to go up to the Slop Chute to check it out and have a couple of beers. The room was big, big! It had a bar, pizza ovens and grill to cook burgers and hot dogs. It also had lots of tables for the guys to spread out on. When we entered the main room, I noticed that there were different colored parachutes spread out on the ceiling. I wondered what they were there for. They looked cool! About a month later I was enjoying a beer at the club with a couple of guys when a pushing and shoving "tussle" broke out in one corner of the room. Two big tables (maybe 20 guys total) were really going at it. What started it was probably a dumb comment about one platoon being better than the other, or something just as ridiculous. It could have gotten out of control if not broken up fast. One of the club's workers hustled down to the tables where the action was and untied a rope attached to the wall. That freed a tables and the guys mixing it up. It was fun watching them struggle to get out from under the parachutes. After order was restored things went back to "normal". No harm no foul. 



Gardening Tips for Lower Back Pain Prevention

John O'Brien Recalls Amazing Career

(This article is dedicated in memory of 17). Ed O'Brien, who died on Feb. 21, 2014).

Back in 1948, St. Mary's HS in South Amboy featured 3 seniors who would go on to Major League Baseball fame, and another who would play professionally in the minors. John and Ed O'Brien hit the big time as players in the early 1950's after their outstanding careers at Seattle University, where they rewrote the institution's baseball and basketball record books...Jack McKeon, was a player and later

managed many different teams for 17 years in the minors, where he notched over 1,000 victories, before getting his call to the big leagues with the Kansas City Royals in 1973. In 2003, he took over the Florida

World Series Baseball team.

championship over the heavily-favored New York Yankees. McKeon is the only manager in history to have won over 1,000 games in the minors and also the majors...Ray Stockton pitched for a couple of seasons in the Detroit Tigers organization, and faced a young Mickey Mantle in the Kansas-Oklahoma-Missouri (K-O-M) League. Mantle hit a long homer off of him, but Stockton got him to ground out, and also struck him out.

The O'Brien twins, in John's words, were "a little small" during their freshman and sophomore years, and were cut from the St. Mary's basketball team, both years until fate stepped in. The team that was supposed to play the Eagles, did not show because of a snowfall, and Coach Charlie Eppinger pulled John and Ed out of the stands to scrimmage against his St. Mary's varsity team. 



Baseball Players From Middlesex/ **Monmouth County** Were Selected

1972-In the '72 Major League Baseball (MLB) Draft, four players from Middlesex County were selected. 
