FROM THE DESK OF TOM REILLY

Allow me to begin by expressing my sincere hope that all of you have had a joyful and relaxing summer. The weather has not always been perfect, but I hope you have had time to get out in the (occasional) sunshine, take some time off from work or school to see friends and family, and enjoy some recreation time at your favorite summer hangout.

The autumn chill that soon will be in the air can be sobering for many of us. The beaches close, our kids go back to school, and many of us adults go back to reality. Perhaps now is a good time to remind ourselves of the value of hard work, hope, and community, as well as the fact that, for every summer that ends, a new one always will come.

September of course also brings with it the anniversary of one of our country's darkest days. It is beyond any of our capacity to set forth in words the indelible impression September 11, 2001 has left on our national character, particularly for those of us who live just across the water from Manhattan. Rather than focus on the tragedy, which we all know well and for which we will have many moments of solemn silence in the days ahead, allow me to provide you a story of hope, remembrance, and community.

In 2002, local resident and volunteer fireman Phil English applied for a piece of the World Trade Center. The World Trade Center Commission replied seven months later, informing him that one piece remained -- the stabilizer for one of the six arms supporting the North Tower antenna. With the help of several local businesses and residents, Phil retrieved the piece from LaGuardia Airport, took it back to South Amboy, and labored to transform the piece of rubble into a monument of remembrance within our City. It is a reminder for all of us that, with some determination, the right mindset, and the help of a community, an artifact of tragedy can become a symbol



of hope and remembrance.

The monument currently sits near our train station. The City will conduct a ceremony at the train plaza on September 11 at 6:00 p.m. For those who wish to join us, you will see that the monument includes a backdrop of the New York skyline as well as engraved bricks which were sold to raise money for the monument's maintenance. If you are interested in purchasing a brick, please call Phil English at 732-688-7956. You can also stop by Independence Fire House and pick up a form.

Finally, let us not forget the value of hard work. With Labor Day approaching, I hope all of us will remember the hardworking men and women on whose backs this country was built. Common men and women from all walks of life have made immeasurable contributions to our national prosperity: steelworkers, ironworkers, auto industry workers, laborers, miners, and many others. Many of them, their names lost to history, worked hard to establish the workplace rights we often take for granted today. If you've ever taken PTO time, received overtime, or even just taken a lunch break, remember that many people strived and sacrificed for decades to make these now common comforts a reality.

The Smoke Column

a proliferation of battery electric vehicles of the charging station and is measured in (BEV's)on our roadways. They are the kilowatts (KW's) which can range from 50 future of highway transportation and laws have already been passed to phase out the production of internal combustion vehicles (ICE's) as we know them by the mid 2030's. So how will the traditional gas station of today look in the future? Traditional gas stations have safety features built into them as the result of many notable events causing deaths and injuries. History shows that as early as 1906, a fire at a gas station to a 50KW charger. It is a requirement that in New York City killed eleven people; in 1910 a gas station fire in Los Angeles killed twenty-three people; in 1921 a gas station fire in Chicago killed twenty people; in 1937 an explosion and resulting fire at a gas station in Philadelphia killed twenty-three people; and the list goes on and on. These tragedies resulted in safety measures at all gas refueling stations. In 1950 a National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) standard was adopted that required automatic emergency shutoff switches to be installed. Throughout the years these standards were updated and now all gasoline refueling stations in the United States are required to have emergency shutoff switches. Most firefighters know the procedures to follow when responding to a refueling station fire. It begins with life safety, followed by emergency shutdown of the pumps, suppression, and establishing an adequate water supply. How would the response differ if the vehicle were a BEV and was plugged into an EV charging station? There are three levels of EV charging stations. Levels 1 & 2 chargers use Alternating Current (AC) voltage of 120V or 240V. Level 3 chargers, known as Direct Current Fast Chargers (DCFC) use DC voltages between 400 VDC and 1000 VDC that deliver energy directly to the battery. The DCFC bypasses the vehicle's on-board charging system. The charging speed for a BEV is influenced by the rate of charge available at the Level 3 charger, the vehicle charge acceptance rate, and the vehicle charging curve. The



Stop By The Hall For More Information

If you have not yet noticed, there is rate of charge relates to the speed capacity KW to 350KW. The higher KW rating results in a Faster charge. But not all vehicles can accept 350 KW of energy. Vehicles that have an acceptance rate of 250KW that are connected to a 50KW charge will charge much slower. Conversely, a BEV with a charge limit of 50KW that is connected to a 350 KW charger will not expedite the charging process more than it would if hooked gasoline refueling stations have emergency shut-off capabilities. Why isn't it mandatory for BEV charging stations to also have some type of emergency shutoff device? The potential for a fire or other emergency incident at a DCFC station represents an extreme hazard. The high voltage energy at these stations is an invisible hazard and is potentially lethal. With the absence of a readily available emergency shutoff device, it places the customers and first responders at significant risk. As of yet, first responders have no tools capable of ensuring that the DC energy hazard has been controlled, unlike the tools available for AC voltages. Although not yet required, some E-Stops (emergency shut offs) are being installed at the charging device rather than at a safe location away from the hazard area thus placing first responders in the hazard area. The Jobs Act of 2021 calls for the installation of 500,000 Level 3 charging stations by 2028. NFPA Electrical Chapter 70 is being re-written at this time but it would not require any of those 500,000 charging stations to install E-Stops. How many injuries or deaths must occur before they become mandatory?


