FRED HENRY WILL NOT SEEK A FIFTH TERM AS MAYOR OF SOUTH AMBOY

After decades of public service, South Amboy Mayor Fred Henry has issued the following statement announcing his decision not to seek another term:

"As many of you know, this year is an election year in South Amboy, with the offices of Mayor and two Council-at-Large seats on the ballot.

"It has been the great honor of my life to serve the people of South Amboy – first for 18 years as a councilman and the past 16 years as Mayor. Throughout my time in office, every decision was made with your help and was guided by what was in the best interest of the community. When I took the oath to faithfully, impartially, and justly perform the duties of Mayor, I took that responsibility seriously and did my very best to uphold it each day. With your help we have made South Amboy a great place to live and raise a family.

"I am deeply grateful to the many dedicated public servants, employees, and community partners who worked alongside me over the years. No one accomplishes anything alone, and I have been fortunate to be surrounded by talented and committed people throughout my tenure.

"After much reflection, I have decided that I will not seek another term as Mayor of South Amboy. This decision is not related to my health or the upcoming election. After decades of public service, I believe the time



FROM THE DESK OF TOM REILLY



It is sometimes called the "great hunger," or "the great famine." In the local language, it is loosely translated as "the bad life" or "the hard times." It was one of the most cataclysmic social and environmental crises in the history of Europe. And it is the reason that many of us live in the United States today.

From 1845 until about 1852, the people of Ireland suffered from a blight to potato crops that brought the nation to its knees. Even to this day, the island's population has not returned to its pre-famine numbers. Many people died, many more left the small island nation for a better life.

Our local community is one of the thousands of places to which these Irish travelers made their new homes. It was not always easy. Antagonistic towards the British, and deeply Catholic, many Irish people were wary of the overwhelmingly Protestant and Anglo-Saxon nation that was Nineteenth Century America. Nevertheless, they placed their hopes on the egalitarian, religiously tolerant nature of American society. It paid off for them.

Irish people got to work, and not just by planting potatoes. They worked on railroads, and in factories and coal mines. Then they built skyscrapers and interstate highways. And then they became statesmen and fathers of industry. Two of the most famous men whose families escaped Ireland during the famine were Henry Ford and President John F. Kennedy.

But Irish contributions to our history are not limited to the period after the famine. During the Revolutionary War, George Washington's army was so swelled with Irishmen that he gave his men the day off for St. Patrick's Day of 1780 (one wonders whether he also did so to insult the British). Washington issued the proclamation from his headquarters in Morristown, not far from here. Of Ireland itself, Washington later wrote that it was "friend to my country in my country's most friendless days."

These shared values and solidarity are a source of much joy and reflection as we approach the St. Patrick's Day season. Our own St. Patrick's Day parade also has

a storied history. It began in 1975 due to the efforts of Frank Conley, then the owner of the Monaghan House. Like those first Irish settlers, the initial parade was modest. It included one bagpiper, local police, and various volunteers.

Over the past 50 years, it has become one of South Amboy's largest and most celebrated traditions. During much of that period, South Amboy's Irish American Association contributed to numerous charitable causes in our community. Today, the Ancient Order of Hibernians, an Irish Catholic organization, continues that proud tradition of noble charitable work. With over 150 members, and with chapters across the country, it is one of the preeminent charitable organizations in our community and across the country.

This year's parade will be held on March 15th beginning at 2:00pm. The list of honorees include: John Dragotta - Grand Marshal; Lee Steiner - Deputy Grand Marshal; and Joseph Britton - Honorary Grand Marshal. Mark your calendars and come out to celebrate a South Amboy tradition. And for those of us with Irish heritage, when you next have your favorite Irish meal -- accompanied as it should be by potatoes of some sort -- remember that "the hard times" often beget good times.

One final note. With all of the cold weather recently, remember that it always could be worse. During the winter of 1917-18, it became so cold that the Raritan Bay froze over completely, allowing locals to walk and drive their cars across the frozen water and all the way to the lighthouse.

South Amboy Elks, Citizen of the Year



is right to pass the baton and support the next chapter of South Amboy's progress.

"I want to thank the voters of South Amboy for placing their trust in me for 34 years. It has been my privilege to serve you and this community, and to help advance projects that benefit our families today and in the future. Together, we have invested in public safety and infrastructure, including new state-of-the-art athletic fields, a new ambulance for our First Aid Squad, new fire trucks, appointed the town's first female Police Chief, provided our local police department with new police equipment, hired new police officers increasing the size of the police department, and expanded parking along Broadway. We successfully launched a ferry service, revitalized long-neglected and contaminated properties, and transformed them into productive ratables – all without burdening taxpayers with the high cost of remediation.

"One project that holds special meaning for me is the Veterans' Memorial Plaza on

Bordentown Ave. When the property was donated to the City, I felt strongly that it should be dedicated to the Veterans who made the ultimate sacrifice for our country.

"I want to thank the Council members I served with. It is through cooperation with them that so much was able to be achieved during my tenure. Their hard work helped make possible the accomplishments in South Amboy during my tenure.

"I am also proud that my administration delivered a budget that reduced municipal taxes while producing a surplus of more than \$6 million, leaving South Amboy in a strong and stable financial position.



Councilman John's Monthly Minute

Highlighting Community Efforts That Make a Difference



This month, I'd like to amplify the work of Sayreville TNR / Coalition of Advocates for Shelter Animals, led locally by Denise Morgan and supported by a dedicated network of volunteers and nonprofit partners. Their mission is simple but essential: humanely manage our community's population of free-roaming and feral cats through Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return (TNVR).

Denise's involvement began a few years ago when she discovered a small colony of cats near her home. What started as concern for a handful of animals quickly grew into a deeper understanding of how unmanaged cat populations affect neighborhoods, strain shelters, and create recurring challenges for residents. She connected with experienced organizations, learned the TNVR process, and soon became part of a larger volunteer effort committed to addressing the issue responsibly.

TNVR is a hands-on, time-intensive process. Volunteers identify colony sites, humanely trap the cats, transport them to partner veterinarians for spay/neuter surgeries and vaccinations, oversee post-care recovery, and return them to monitored locations. Kittens and socialized cats often enter foster or adoption programs. Even after the veterinary work is complete, volunteers continue monitoring these colonies to ensure long-term stability. The goal is not just compassion—it is practical management that reduces the number of unmanaged cats over time.

Much of this work is funded entirely through private donations. Volunteers contribute fuel, food, medical supplies, emergency care costs, and countless hours of their own time. Their efforts help prevent growing colony sizes, reduce nuisance

concerns, lighten the load on municipal resources, and create a more balanced approach to a longstanding community issue.

While no single method is perfect, TNVR has been used across the country because it is a thoughtful, workable solution that helps communities stabilize outdoor cat populations without placing the entire burden on local government. Here in Sayreville, Denise and her team are filling a real and immediate need.

To Denise, our nonprofit partners, and every volunteer involved—thank you. Your work may be quiet, but its impact is felt across our town. Residents interested in learning more or supporting this work can follow Sayreville TNR on Facebook at facebook.com/sayrevilletnr.

Before closing, I'd also like to recognize Brianne Rogers and her newly formed 501(c)(3), Saving All Species NJ (SAS). Although the nonprofit is new, Brianne has supported animal welfare efforts in Sayreville and South Amboy for many years. At the end of December 2025, SAS hosted its inaugural TNR Van Day event, expanding local access to low-cost spay/neuter services and offering another valuable resource for responsible colony management. We appreciate Brianne's continued commitment to our community.

The Smoke Column

(Part #2) At 0001 hours radio traffic indicated that there were holes in the floor followed by a partial floor collapse. A muffled MAYDAY was heard approximately 0004 hours after the radio announcement of the partial collapse at 0001 hours. Since the MAYDAY was muffled and unclear, the IC asked to have the MAYDAY repeated. There was no response! Hearing a MAYDAY should automatically activate the Rapid Intervention Team (RIT) but there was none in place yet. All MAYDAYS should be understood that someone's life is in peril. Two MAYDAY calls were issued from the basement-a basement that fire officials did not know existed at the time. Command officers heard the Mayday calls, but did not know who was issuing them, where the firefighter was located, or what the problem was. They initially identified another firefighter as being the one thought was missing; when he was found, NO further work was done to make sure no one else had made the call. An incomplete Personal Accountability Report (PAR) was conducted. It was at this point that the IC was unaware of who could be missing and called the MAYDAY. Any one of many unaccountable firefighters could have called MAYDAY. At 0017 hours, there was an increase in smoke conditions under the front window and thoughts were that there may be a fire below grade. REALLY! As a result of an incomplete 360-degree size-up by the IC, no one realized that YES there was a basement in the structure. The homeowners were near the command post and at any time could have been asked if there was a basement but was not asked until AFTER MAYDAY. At 0017 hours, firefighters attempted to enter the basement through the garage but were turned back due to a collapse. At 1237 hours, a full 83 minutes since arrival and 33 minutes since the MAYDAY call, it was determined that someone was missing. NFPA 1561 8.13.2(1) directs that "the safety officer must be assigned as early in the incident as possible." This did not occur. It did not occur until AFTER the MAYDAY was called by "the lost firefighter, some 45 minutes into



the incident. As a result of this incident, the firefighter was LODD. The responsibility for the LODD fell upon the Fire Chief (IC) and other officers. The incident resulted in a court case because of the decisions or lack thereof made by the IC and his assistants. We know that all officers and IC's must be trained and certified on Incident Command and to use this system at ALL incidents. The IC in this case had NO incident command training or certification until after the incident. The deviations from the standards that were directly cause of the LODD were because of: failure to maintain a stationary command post; no training in NIMS; confusion with management with multiple chiefs issuing orders; incomplete 360-degree survey; failure to conduct a proper PAR; failure to establish a Safety Officer on the scene; failure to evaluate the risk versus benefit; failed RIT operation. The court case lasted 7 days and the jury deliberations only took 3 hours to decide the results. The IC and other officers were each to blame for the LODD and were found liable for on-scene decisions they made in the hours after the fire broke out. The court awarded 31.5 million to the widow and children of the LODD. I would never want to find any officer/officers in a similar position as we all try our best at ALL incidents. To the officers in our local fire departments, train, train, and more train. Evaluate the decisions you plan to make BEFORE you make them and think of the consequences. As I said, many of those decisions must be made in seconds. We think that this will never happen to us, it always happens to the other guy but to the other guy, we ARE the other guy!

Pallone Secures \$250,000 in Funding for New South Amboy Park and Playground

Congressman Frank Pallone, Jr. (NJ-06) secured \$250,000 in federal Community Project Funding in Fiscal Year 2026 to support the creation of a new park and playground near South Amboy Middle High School, converting a vacant lot into a safe outdoor play space designed for young children.

"This funding gives South Amboy the ability to turn an underused space into something families can rely on," said Pallone. "A safe, well-designed playground near the school creates opportunities for kids to be active and for families to spend time together, while strengthening the surrounding community."

The funding will allow the city to construct a dedicated preschool play area featuring age-appropriate playground equipment, including low swings, slides, a sandbox, and play structures. The project is intended to provide a safe, accessible outdoor environment that encourages physical activity and healthy recreation for South Amboy's youngest residents.

"On behalf of the City of South Amboy and especially our young citizens, I would like to thank Congressman Frank Pallone

for the \$250,000 appropriation," said South Amboy Mayor Fred Henry. "This generous funding will go a long way in helping to relocate our David Street park to the Allie Clark Sports Complex. With the expansion of the park more opportunities will be provided for our city's children to recreate in a healthy and safe environment. Congressman Pallone continues to be a great friend and representative to the City of South Amboy."

According to city plans, the new play area will span approximately 2,500 square feet and will be designed to meet national childcare standards for outdoor play spaces, accommodating up to 33 children at a time. The project also includes landscaping with shade-providing trees and native plants, as well as improvements to a nearby parking area to enhance safety and accessibility for families.

The South Amboy park and playground project was requested by Pallone through the Fiscal Year 2026 federal appropriations process, which allows members of the U.S. House to direct Community Project Funding toward local priorities that improve public spaces and quality of life.

The Interview: Mayor Fred Henry

On January 1, 2027, the City of South Amboy will have a new mayor for the first time since Fred Henry succeeded John T. "Jack" O'Leary in 2011. Recently, Mayor Henry decided not to seek office again, and at the end of this term, will have served a total of 16 years at the helm. The 16 years in the top spot is second all-time in the history of South Amboy, with O'Leary's 24 year run as mayor number one. Prior to his time as mayor, Fred served the city for 18 years as a dedicated councilman, so his combined total of 34 years in political office is the most-ever for "The Pleasant Little City."

When did Fred Henry initially develop an interest in politics? His father Fred Henry was a South Amboy City Council President in the 1960's, and the mayor recalled how as a youngster his political interest began. "I still remember the first year my dad ran in 1960, and I got involved watching the city when I was about 10 years old."

He attended St. Mary's Grammar School and then St. Mary's High School, where he graduated in '68. He was very active in high school, especially sports, and was a starting pitcher for Coach Tom Otto's Eagles. In addition, he played basketball for St. Mary's C.Y.O. team under legendary Coach Jim MacKay. Following graduation, he went to Middlesex County College and then to Trenton State College. He majored in Social Studies and earned his degree in English. "I liked history, and wanted to resurrect the Historical Society in South Amboy," he said. During his college days, he also pitched on the varsity teams at MCC and Trenton State College.

After college, he worked on the Raritan River Railroad for a year under Ray Stockton. A teaching position became available at St. Mary's Elementary School in 1974, and he was hired and became the Science teacher for 7th and 8th grade. "Ed O'Connor was in my first class," recalled the Mayor.

A Social Studies teacher position opened up, and he stepped into that role, and worked a total of 7 years at St. Mary's.

His next step in the educational field came when South Amboy Middle School had an opening for a fill-in English teacher, and Henry took the job, and commuted to Spotswood everyday for a half year, because at that time, the children were bused from South Amboy due to overcrowding.

When Hoffman HS was seeking an English teacher, Fred made another move there, and then taught Social Studies. Around 2005, he was hired to the new position as Dean of Students at the high school, a job he held for 10 years through 2015. He said, "The job was to discipline kids, and I was also responsible for putting together a code book. I liked the job, but missed teaching in the classroom, because it was always interesting."

Even with his very busy schedule, he found time to serve as the Athletic Director for South Amboy High School for 14 years. "It was a lot of work, but I really liked it. I got to see other schools and great teams," he said. In addition, the energetic Henry coached at least a combined 20 years in baseball/softball, basketball, and cross country.

When asked what he was most proud of as an educator, he replied, "Getting through to a couple kids who weren't into education. High school kids liked poetry, such as McBeth. I commanded respect, and kids call me Mr. Henry, even today. I taught about life, movies, history and literature. My favorite movie is "Casablanca" and I showed it to the kids and they liked it."

Mayor Henry had several highlights in his athletic career that he was most proud of sharing that include: pitching a 1-hitter as St. Mary's blasted South River, 10-0 during his junior year. One of the Rams players was future NFL star football player Joe Theisman. Fred also recalled St. Mary's Opening Day game against St. Joe's of Toms River in his senior year, when he and Mike Drahos combined for a brilliant no-hitter.

I then asked Mayor Henry what it was like for you to serve South Amboy for a total of 34 years?

He said, "When you're serving, you've got to keep in mind that you can't please everyone. Do what you can for the greater good. Do the

best you can for taxpayers. The only satisfaction is we're doing something for taxpayers. You can never accomplish everything you set out to do. For example, we got the ferry progress up and running after 20 years in the making! There were so many meetings and the process was complex, and we had to get money. We also got new state-of-the-art ballfields."

In the future, Mayor Henry said that he feels after he leaves office, "The ferry terminal will be completed, and we will need a new City Hall and Police Dept. because we're running out of space and need to be upgraded." His advice to the next mayor is simply "Just do the right thing. Think it out."

Mayor Henry said that what he will miss most about being mayor is "Working with people and trying to solve their problems, some governmental, and some personal. You can't solve everything and can't please everybody. People elected me because they trusted me and believed in my integrity. I never sought self-accolades. People come back to South Amboy, and say how nice the town looks."

The only thing he didn't care for as mayor was "People making comments, when they didn't have all the facts."

He hopes "People will remember me, not as a politician, I've never considered myself as a politician, but as a person with integrity and honesty would be sufficient to me."

Mayor Henry has plenty of praise and thanks to his wife Linda and brother Bill. He said, "My wife Linda has been my right hand person all along. She's very supportive and was always there. I told her she could get involved as much as she wants, someone I could confide in. She's first to hear and edit my speeches." He also credits his brother Bill (who is Chairman of the Sayreville Democratic Party) with helping him win his second time in a primary against Jack O'Connell. "If it wasn't for Bill, I don't think I would have won." He also said "I will miss the dedication of all the good workers at City Hall and all the employees, Public Workers, Firefighters, First Aid, and Police. So many dedicated people that love our community."

Middlesex County Office of Health Services Measles Update

County provides critical information for residents, healthcare providers, and public health partners

The Middlesex County Office of Health Services is reporting to residents about a potential exposure associated with a newly diagnosed case of measles in a non-New Jersey resident who visited New Jersey while infectious at the Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital–New Brunswick in the Pediatric Emergency Department on Friday, February 6, 2026, 11:15 pm through Saturday, February 7, 2026, 4:25 am.

As of Tuesday, February 10, 2026, no additional cases have been identified in New Jersey. The Middlesex County Office of Health Services and the New Jersey Department of Health are working to identify and notify individuals who may have been exposed to the individual while the individual was infectious. Exposed individuals who are infected could develop symptoms as late as Saturday, February 28, 2026.

Measles is a highly contagious viral disease. It spreads through the air when an infected person coughs, sneezes, or talks. People can also become sick if they come in contact with mucus or saliva (spit) from an infected person.

Common Symptoms of Measles

- High fever
- Cough
- Runny nose
- Red watery eyes
- Rash (breaks out 3-5 days after symptoms begin)
- Exposure to Measles

Individuals who believe they have been exposed to someone with measles should call their healthcare provider before going to a medical office or emergency department. A person infected with measles can spread the disease before showing symptoms. Special arrangements need to be made when visiting a healthcare provider or emergency department to help protect others from getting sick.

Measles Prevention

The best way to prevent measles is with the measles, mumps, and rubella (MMR) vaccine. The following people should be vaccinated against measles:

- All children over one year of age who have not yet been vaccinated
- Children between 6 months and 1 year of age who will be traveling internationally or visiting a community with an ongoing measles outbreak (This dose will not count toward the primary series, and two additional doses after one year of age will still be required.)
- Adults who have not yet been vaccinated and were born after 1957 and have not had laboratory confirmation of a previous measles infection.
- Adults of any age who will be traveling internationally or visiting a community with an ongoing measles outbreak, who have not previously received two doses of MMR.

The Middlesex County Office of Health Services will continue to work with local partners to monitor the situation and will provide updates as they become available. For additional guidance and information for residents, please contact the Middlesex County Office of Health Services at 732-745-3100.

Sayreville Scouts, Arleth Students Unearth Y2K Time Capsule

As the world prepared to ring in the new year and welcome 2026, local scouts and local elementary school students had one last bit of unfinished business to attend to in 2025.

In January of 2000, to commemorate the turn of the new millennium, the town's now-defunct Cub Scout Pack 469 buried a time capsule in front of the flagpole at Arleth Elementary School to be opened 25 years later. However, with those young scouts now well into their 30's and many of the pack's adult leadership retired, January 2025 quietly passed and the capsule remained buried and mostly forgotten past its 25th year.

As the year continued, the prospect of opening the capsule became an infrequent "what if" for the Clark family, whose father served as the pack's Scoutmaster but later moved out-of-state and left scouting. With the end of 2025 drawing nearer, the family's four sons, who all became Eagle Scouts as members of Troop 97, turned "what if" into "why not?"

Determined to follow through with the pack's promise to open the capsule in 2025, brothers Michael and Christopher, high school history teachers in Union County, drew on their experience as educators to organize the capsule's unearthing alongside local scouts and to create an educational experience for the third graders of their alma mater, Arleth Elementary. After emailing school and district officials, Michael quickly received a response from Arleth principal Mr. Robert Preston, an active scout leader himself, who proved immediately receptive to the idea. Preston, who taught the eldest Clark, Curtis III, and Michael, an AP and honors-level history teacher at Rahway High School, helped organize an assembly for Arleth's third grade students on Friday, December 12 to review the contents of the capsule, which included: **Photos and letters from each Cub Scout den; A copy of Boys' Life magazine; Coins from 1999; Art, drawings, and collages; Pokemon trading**

cards; Pokemon, Hot Wheels, and Rugrats figurines; A letter included in the capsule reads in full:

"As you look through the items that were placed in here twenty-five years ago, we hope they bring a smile to your face, maybe some memories to those who placed a memento in here and some insight to who and how we were (sic) in the year 2000. As the items were placed in this time capsule, some tried to envision what the year 2025 would be like - from cars that floated, to computers built into students desks, to a much more peaceful and thoughtful world. Maybe some or all of these thoughts are what it is like during 2025! But one thing we hope is still around during your time is the Cub Scout Tradition! As you read this, many of the children who placed items in here will be between the ages of 30 and 40, and their leaders in the 50's and 60's. Hopefully we have done our jobs and your world has become a better place because of our efforts. So sit back and enjoy going through this time capsule. Take some time to look at the coins of the 1990's, the fads, the toys, and the pictures of the Cub Scout Pack 469. Maybe you'll even see yourself! GOOD LUCK TO ALL OF YOU!

As part of the presentation, Clark also included momentos, keepsakes, and collectibles from his time at Arleth Elementary: A working GameBoy Color; Pokemon, Yu Gi Oh!, and sports trading cards; A class photo from Ms. Bulla's 3rd Grade Class in 2000; Mr. Clark's 2nd and 3rd Grade report cards from 1999 and 2000; Mr. Clark wishes to extend a special thanks to the scouts, scout leaders, and local figures who attended to support the initiative and help catalog the capsule's items: Mr. Art Rittenhouse, Mr. Tom Tighe, Mr. Joe McCoy, Mr. Brant Wright, Mr. Edward Anderson and scouts and leaders from local Troops 95, 96, 97 and 777.







It's the Weeblemeister once again wishing you all a great fishing year. The rivers and bays are now mostly closed for Striped Bass and Winter Flounder until March 1st. It's just as well as I didn't see much when I checked local bay beaches, so it was nothing to write home about. The fishing will be slow when it reopens later on, however there are a few Stripers in the ocean at LBI and Island Beach surf as it is legal to fish for these fish. Regulations require one slot fish between 28 and 31 inches remain the same. Party boats and private charter boats are catching Blackfish. Some of their catches are going from 10 to 13 pounds with a 22 pound monster caught on a private charter out of Barnegat Light. Some Ling and a few Cod have been caught.

Fresh Water

It's the worst of both worlds with very cold weather and low water conditions. For the most part there is not enough safe ice in most upstate lakes but some safe ice is in the coves in upstate Lake Hopatcong. Some nice Pickerel and Large Mouth Bass have been caught there. Try the cove at Bertrand's Amusement Park as it produces some nice Pickerel and Yellow Perch. River and stream water levels still remain low at this time.




