Coughlin, Lopez Retain Assembly Seats

New Jersey State Assembly Speaker Craig Coughlin and his running mate Yvonne Lopez, both Democrats, were re-elected to their Assembly seats. Coughlin topped the field of 5 candidates with 17,878 votes, followed by Lopez 17,039, Republicans Rocco Genova 9,046, and Christian Onuoha 8,705, and Independent William Cruz 661.

The ballot question whether NJ should extend property tax deductions to military veterans who live in continuing care retirement communities, was approved by a vote of 867,123-279,913.

Walsh Tops Sayreville Board of Education

John Walsh pulled in 2,978 votes to top a field of 4 candidates vying for 3-three year terms. He was followed by Lucille Bloom 2,914, Daniel Balka 2,712, and James Bello 2,331 votes.

Three Chosen For SA Board of Education

South Amboy voters selected three candidates for 3-year terms. Ann Marie "Amy" McLaughlin topped the voting by racking up 606 votes, and was followed by Joan Marie Conway 534, and Rafael Albarran 496.

The voting went as follows: Charles Kenny (D) 66,194, Kenneth Armwood (D) 65,921, Clary Azcona-Barber (D) 64,116, Thomas J. Cohan (R) 44,893, Edna Cox-Rivers (R) 43,956, Gregg R. Rubenstein (R) 42,659, Brian P. Kulas (An Inspired Advocate) 3,219.

Cassidy-Maher Win Council Seats

Two, three-year terms for Borough Council were up for grabs in the Nov. 5th election, and Incumbent Democrat Michele Cassidy Maher topped the voting with 3,630 votes, followed by Republican Donna Roberts with 3,597 votes. They were followed by Democrat David McGill had 3,565 votes, and Republican Christian Hibinski 3,453.

Kilpatrick Wins Mayoral Race By 3 Republicans Request Recount

In probably the closest election in history for Mayor in the Borough of Sayreville, Democratic Councilwoman Victoria Kilpatrick was announced the new winner by a slim, 3-vote margin over Republican Arthur J. Rittenhouse, 3,629-3,626. The latest tally came after a final count of provisional and vote-by-mail.

The unofficial count which was released immediately after the election on Nov. 5th had Rittenhouse ahead by 33 votes, 3,578-3,545. Rittenhouse, a former Borough Councilman said that "We have requested a recount, and will also contest the election because of irregularities. There are 41 provisional ballots we feel should be looked at."



John Skarzynski and Mark Thompson were two of the best pitchers in New Jersey, and received all kinds of honors and awards. Barbara McCabe and Vicky Gonzalez were co-editors of the yearbook. McCabe also starred in all sports. Robert Monaghan was President of the Chess Club. Some of the top songs on the radio during the 1983-84 school year were "Tell Her About It," "Islands In The Stream," "All Night Long," "Karma Chameleon," "Jump," "Against All Odds," "Footloose." Some of the Class of 1984, selected randomly included Sandra Dowling, Clark Gregoreski, Eric Krauss, Thomas Krygier Jr., Susan Kuhn, Margaret Miller, Tracey Popowski, Ann Marie Whitaker, Todd Zulin. Other talented senior athletes were John Attardi, Carson Bloodgood, Billy Bright, Bob Gallery, Kevin Gorczyca, Ken Huryk, Pat Leonard, Joe Lewis, Kim Reick, Jim Shaw, Jeri Smith, Mike Toth, Stanley Zawacki. There were some very interesting and talented people featured in the Hoffman High School Class of '84. Athletes, intellectuals, characters and comedians, all made this class something very special.

Jung Kim, affectionately known by all as "Kash," came to the United States from Korea in 1969 with his family, and they settled on the East Side of Manhattan, and then moved to Queens. The hard-working proprietors have many wonderful memories of their years in business. Kash said, "One thing I find amazing is when a customer comes in and brings his grandchildren in to the shop, and shares a memory of when he first came in as a teenager." He added, "We have met so many great and interesting people. Former Heavyweight boxing champion Larry Holmes had a boat here and used to come to the shop incognito. Geraldo Rivera also was one of our customers."

The Kims have a son and daughter who have been very successful in their lives. The son is a graduate of Michigan University Grad School, and has been working for Public Health in New York and in Kash's words "Is in training to take over the business. He showed interest, and we've been fishing." Their daughter has a Masters Degree from Harvard University Graduate School, and along with her husband, formed Opelite Media Co., which makes videos for education and politics, and she works for companies that allocate funds for educational activities in Massachusetts.

So, Kash Kim, what is your advice to someone who hopes to open a business one day? "Do what you enjoy, so it's not actually working, and you become good at what you do," he said.

The Smoke Column

As we approach the holidays and make plans to decorate our homes with festive lighting displays, keep in mind SAFETY. Before you decorate either the inside or outside of your home, look very carefully at the electrical wiring on your displays. If your lighting sets are older, look at the wires themselves for any cracking or deterioration which can lead to a short circuit or an overloaded circuit. Just because there are additional outlets for you to plug your displays into doesn't mean it's safe to do so. Remember that the circuits in your home are rated at either 15 or 20 amps and you should not go above 80% of that rating. So, what does that mean? A 15 amp circuit should have a maximum of 12 amps of electrical wiring where a 20 amp circuit no more than 16 amps of electricity usage. READ the little notices that come with each set of lights, each display, or any other electrical device you intend to use. This small tag will tell you the number of amps that it will draw when plugged in and lit. If you are using multiple displays/lights on the same circuit, add them up to get a total of the amperage being drawn. Don't exceed the rating of your circuit or the individual light set otherwise the wiring will start to overheat and possibly lead to an electrical fire in your home. When decorations state on the label "For Indoor Use Only" this means they are for inside use ONLY. They may not be waterproofed to be used outside. It may be a nice warm sunny day when you are decorating your home so this may not be a concern to you. BUT, in late December or early January there could be plenty of snow on the ground and on your decorations, which could cause them to short circuit due to moisture getting

into the sockets. This situation could also prove deadly to you if you attempt to fix the circuit and get electrocuted! DON'T leave your light/displays on when you are not at home or go to sleep.

During the holidays, just about everyone wants to be a culinary specialist showing off their skills in preparing large family dinners or baking lots of holiday goodies. If these are your plans, please plan ahead and accordingly! Some of you may remember my Thanksgiving story of a few years ago where the young cook wanted to impress the in-laws on Thanksgiving. After shopping for all the necessary items, the big day finally arrived. After making the initial preparations, it was now time to preheat the oven. While the oven was pre-heating, the kitchen started to fill with heavy black foul-smelling smoke which continued to circulate throughout the entire house. 911 was called and was reported as a kitchen fire. To you culinary artists out there, please remember to check the inside of your oven for any items you may have stored inside BEFORE preheating. In this case, Tupperware was stored inside the oven and was destroyed along with the stove when the oven was turned on to pre-heat. This was one embarrassing moment for the cook.

For the upcoming holidays incorporate safety in whatever you plan to be doing. When cooking/baking, be careful with those hot pots and pans especially if there are little children running around the house. It only takes an instant for a child to run past the stove and accidentally hit an overhanging pot handle and spill a scalding liquid on himself/herself.

I want to wish all my readers a very safe, enjoyable, and Happy Thanksgiving!





"Mickey" Mauro Was An Amazing Man/Top-Notch Entertainer

The passing of Michael "Mickey" Mauro Sr. on Sept. 6th at age 68, shocked and saddened his large family, and countless friends. Known affectionately as "Mickey" by all who knew him, he was born in Hoboken, lived in Perth Amboy, and graduated from Perth Amboy HS, lived in Parlin for 40 years, and moved to Orlando, Florida.

Blessed with an incredible singing voice, he was one of the top entertainers for generations. He was an FDU graduate, and a successful businessman/owner for many years, but first and foremost, loved his family.

In 1968, he was the talented lead singer for The Young Temptations, also known as The Young Tempts, the top young band in Perth Amboy. The group's big moment came in '69, when they were the opening act for legendary singer Marvin Gaye at the old Majestic Theater in Perth Amboy.

Mauro, with his golden voice/tremendous on-stage presence/terrific personality certainly appeared to be a rising star in the music industry, and went on to have a good run with The Michael Mauro Review, which included the late Joey Mongiovi, Steve Turk, Jeff Marnes, and Paul Badia. This group had some really big shows, and Mickey went on to record a great cover version of "Susie Q." on vinyl, and this song had a really powerful beat, with a very different style than the original. In 1983, he recorded a 12" maxi vinyl, "Talk To Me" on Sutra Records, which is an excellent song with a strong beat, perfect for dancing.

One of Mickey's last local performances was in 2011 at Covello's Restaurant in

Morgan, where he enthralled the crowd with his singing of covers by Frank Sinatra, Tom Jones, Neil Diamond, and more. If you go to youtube.com, you can see him singing by typing in "The Michael Mauro Show" which was posted in 2011. He also sang an outstanding acapella version of "At This Moment" in 2012, as a video to be sent to the TV show "The X-Factor."

Debbie Carling saw Mickey in concert for the first time back in April 1977 at the old Club Bene in Morgan. Shortly after, her late husband Willy Carling, a good friend of Mauro's, introduced her to the singer, and she became a huge fan. The couple enjoyed Mickey's shows many times through the years. Debbie said, "My favorite song that he sang was "Delilah" originally recorded by Tom Jones."

Many fans and friends said goodbye to Mickey on Facebook, and Al Bolk, wrote and sang a heartfelt tribute to his good friend titled "My Friend Don't Sing Here Anymore." Al did an excellent job with the lyrics and catchy hook part of his song which he dedicated to Mickey.

Michael "Mickey" Mauro will never be forgotten by the countless family, friends, acquaintances, and fans who loved and admired him.

Bill "Biff" McKeon MLB Scout - Part 5 My Friend Buddy Kerr

During one of the many conversations "Biff" and I had about his scouting days, he mentioned that along the way he became very good friends with a guy named Buddy Kerr. I found this interesting because I remembered Buddy from my early days (mid-late 1940s) when I was a very big New York Giants fan. (Probably one of the few in South Amboy). He was the Giants shortstop in those days, and it brought back memories of when I used to listen to the games on radio station WMCA (?). We did not have a TV in those days, so the radio was my ticket to the games. Hall of Famer Frankie Frisch did the play by play. In the winter of 1949, Buddy was traded by the Giants to the Boston Braves along with outfielder Willard Marshall and third baseman Sid Gordon for Eddy Stanky and Alvin Dark. Buddy was a slick fielding shortstop who held the record for errorless games (68) until it was broken in 1989 by Kevin Elster of the New York Mets. He was an All Star in 1948 and was in the running for MVP in both 1945 and 1946. He retired after the 1951 season. After he retired, he went into scouting, first with the Giants, and then as a special assignment scout for the New York Mets. Buddy was born in 1922 in Astoria, Long Island and grew up in Manhattan a short distance from the Polo Grounds, the Giants home field. He signed with the Giants in 1941. He passed away on November 7th, 2006, a day after his 84th birthday. Bill continues:

"Buddy Kerr was my best friend in scouting. I met Buddy in my early scouting days when he was the San Francisco Giants eastern scouting supervisor, and Frank Burke of Perth Amboy was his NJ scout. We continued the friendship when he became the Special Assignment Scout for the New York Mets. It wasn't long before Buddy would call me and ask where I was going to scout. He took a liking to me and before long we were a twosome. We traveled together scouting the eastern states I was the driver (with a KC Royals car). Buddy had an old Ford that sometimes ran and sometimes didn't, so I was his chauffeur. We also traveled together in Florida during Spring Training. Buddy lived in Oradell, New Jersey and some of the time (when his car didn't work) he would take the train, and

I would pick him up (wherever he landed), and away we would go scouting.

I remember one Sunday afternoon in Baltimore Buddy said he was going to Syracuse, New York the next day. I said I was going to fly to Milwaukee the next day. When I got to the hotel in Milwaukee, Buddy was already checking into the hotel, with two other scouts we hung around with: Lenny Yokum, Pittsburgh Pirates 81, and Freddy Schafer Braves, 83. Buddy was 78, and I was the "kid" at 68. I don't know what happened in Syracuse and why he was suddenly in Milwaukee. When the four of us were in Cleveland on a scouting assignment, we loved going to the Municipal Stadium. It held over 80,000 people, but in those days, the Indians were not very good, and the crowd was always in the 10,000 to 20,000 range. So, whoever guessed closest to the attendance was the winner, and got free beer and pretzels after the game. We would all take a guess except Freddy. I would guess 12,500, Lenny 12,000 Buddy 12,750. Freddy would always listen to the radio, waiting for the announcer to give the attendance in the 8th inning, 13,600. Then he would give his guess 14,000, and surprise- when the attendance went up on the scoreboard, Freddy was the winner. We all knew he waited until it was announced on the radio. Buddy was very religious, and the four of us would always try to attend morning mass in whatever city we were scouting in. During my early years when I was a school administrator, Buddy and several other northern New Jersey scouts would have lunch together during the off season in different diners. Even when I moved to Indiana, I still had lunch with Buddy, when I visited relatives in Jersey, mostly in New Brunswick right off the Turnpike. When Buddy passed away in 2006, I received a note from his wife expressing how Buddy enjoyed our friendship. I miss Buddy, and think of him and the many great times we enjoyed together, being able to make a dollar doing something we loved, being part of major league baseball.

Next month we will wrap up Bill's scouting years, and see where he goes from there.

Who were the top performers of that memorable season?

Broadway Cafe was led by Jack Brennan's 3 touchdowns, Ed O'Leary 1, and Dan Weinman 1. Joe Murtha led the league with 2 field goals. Brothers Inn got plenty of offensive pop from the league's touchdown and scoring leader, Gary Lange, who found the end zone for 4 TD's and 24 points. Teammate Joe Castellano scored 3 TD's and led the league by kicking 3 extra points for 21 points, (2nd in the league). Brothers Rich

Klein hit paydirt twice, and booted 2 extra points, Kevin Nemeth scored a touchdown, and Tom Gorman kicked an extra point. Mike's Corner was paced by Jim Pavlonnis with 3 touchdowns, Nick Charmello 1, and Ron Croddick 1. Dan Paone connected on 2 point after touchdowns. 


1969-One of St. Mary's greatest basketball teams in history were defeated in the Parochial B semifinals at Atlantic City's Convention Hall by a powerful Gloucester Catholic, 69-65, before a packed house of 2,864 screaming fans.

First year coach Don Coveleski's club made one of the most valiant comeback attempts ever, as they trailed 55-34 with 9:25 left in the game, but played tremendous pressurized defense, before time ran out on

this standout group of athletes. Co-captain Jim McCloud, in his final high school game paced the scoring with 24 points, 10 coming down the stretch in the fourth quarter. Co-captain Mark Bratus pumped in 15 points, was a perfect 9-for-9 on the free throw line, and grabbed 9 rebounds. Bob Howarth contributed 8 rebounds for the Eagles, who finished with one of the all-time best records in school history (21-4).







Pedestrian Overpass Removed

I witnessed the dismantling of the Henry Street pedestrian overpass at the train tracks downtown on the evening of Oct 25-26, 2019.

The workers basically took it apart in two pieces. First, they connected a crane to the top of one of the overpass's walls. They then used torches to sever the cross links in the overpass's floor which connected the overpass's two walls. After severing the wall's connections to the concrete support piers, they then lifted it with the crane. The workers used ropes to turn the suspended wall 90 degrees so as to avoid striking the multitude of wires that surrounded it during the remainder of its lift (see video still shot in the attached file entitled "Removal of Henry Street Pedestrian Overpass, South Amboy NJ (26 Oct 2019, ~0315am)"). Once clear of the wires, the wall as moved above Mason Avenue and eventually loaded onto a large flatbed trailer. This concluded around 3:15 am on Oct. 26, 2019. I didn't stick around to watch the removal of the remaining wall



FIRST TURKEY & FIRST TRUE LOVE

It's that time of year when discounted Halloween candy and cheap Halloween outfits are squeezed between not so cheap Christmas items, many of which seem like they've been unsold for far too long. To all of us who have been around for longer than we care to admit that means one thing...it's the time when every writer in the world tries to tell everyone who either hasn't been around very long or who just hasn't spent much time in the kitchen how to cook the Thanksgiving turkey. Each year seems a repeat of the year before probably because it is. Writers become experts; short order cooks become experts; and even people who have never touched an uncooked turkey before try to show us how to fry one in the backyard without getting burned from the sizzling oil. Unfortunately, none of those so-called experts were around to give me any advice when I cooked my first turkey, one which was so big, it could have passed away from old age. I was in Germany in 1967 with my husband. I was all of 19 years of age. Unfortunately, the man I had married and who later became my ex, wasn't the one I should have married in the first place. As brains aren't fully developed until around 26 years of age, I was way too young to have gotten married, but then again, it was a time when guys my age were fighting in Vietnam, many of them coming back "broken," while others never did return at all.

The name of the man I should have married must go unmentioned. I'll only say he was a local boy my age, one with a bright future in front of him. He was my secret love then and must remain so. It was different for him as he had loved me openly, as only young guys can do when they fall in love for

the first time. I was his first love, and as he'd later tell me, I had "kicked him to the curb." When I realized the mistake I had made it was still a time when "good girls" didn't call boys, so I never saw him again. He stayed at college instead of coming home I had heard.

I had made another mistake, a really big one, and that's how I ended up being in Germany unable to lift the freebie turkey given to the guys at the Army missile base where my "mistake" had been stationed that Thanksgiving of 1967. We had rented a two room basement apartment built almost entirely underground in the little village of Carlsberg, a place which made the "Pleasant Little City" seem like Manhattan. It was also a place surrounded by ex (?) Nazis. Inside the apartment was a kitchen sink the kind which hung on the wall, and it had one faucet for cold water. The stove was right next to it, making the chore of heating water in a heavy cast iron kettle a bit easier. The stove was also really narrow and had an oven with only one dial to turn it on and turn it off. All the lifting of the heavy kettle had given me a little muscle in my arm but not enough muscle to lift the turkey without falling into the stove when doing it. With the help of a meat tester I had turned the oven off and on for most of the day. Finally it was done, well almost. I hadn't known to clean and wash the inside of the turkey beforehand so that's how I learned where the giblets were kept. Mistakes...I made quite a few when I was young...but didn't we all??





Cold Weather Exercise

Exercising outdoors in cold weather can be exhilarating. Even if skiing isn't your all-time favorite sport, you can have just as much fun running, cycling, or walking in winter time. Winter sunlight can revive your spirits, and exercise in the cool, crisp air can relieve the stress and tension related to the busy holidays.

There are special considerations to remember for cold-weather exercise:

-Athletes may not be aware of the loss of fluids in cold weather, but the loss is real and potentially dangerous. -Athletes have similar hydration needs year round, but many of them simply don't drink enough fluids during the winter months. Sports nutrition experts advise athletes to drink about one quart of non-caffeinated fluids for every 1,000 calories expended each day. "Drink two cups of fluid two hours before exercise and least 4-6 ounces of fluid every 15-20 minutes during exercise."

-Don't overdose. Exercise raises body temperatures significantly and even a moderate workout can make you feel as if it's 30 degrees warmer. The answer to this is wearing several layers of loose-fitting thin layers of clothes.

-The first layer should be thermal underwear made of a fabric that draws perspiration away from your body. -That layer should not be cotton, as cotton holds moisture next to your skin and makes you feel cold and clammy.

-Your middle layer should be a synthetic turtleneck and wool swather. Sweat pants or Lycra tights worn over thermals will help keep your legs warm. If precipitation is evident, your outer jacket should be waterproof, wind-resistant, yet breathable. Or for a short workout in dry weather, just an ordinary windbreaker would be suitable.

-Zippers make clothes more adaptable for controlling the amount of air you let in or for removing quickly. -Mittens are warmer than gloves. Fingers resting against each other stay warmer than fingers separated by the added air surface between the fingers of gloves.

-Headgear is important since you lose so much heat through your head. Be sure to wear good running shoes, with enough support and cushion.







Salt Water

The big change in our weather pattern to cold has changed fishing. Striped Bass are now moving down the coast from New England. Some are quite big. The Queen Mary and other party boats that jig for them are catching some Bass going over 40 pounds. Some days the catch is better than others. There are some big Bluefish around going up to 15 pounds. The surf is also producing Stripers on plugs. There are large Bunkers schools past the surf line and big Bluefish are right on them. The real cold weather coming up will move these fish out of the area. Raritan Bay shore fishing is slow. I did see a few short Stripers caught at Ideal Beach one night. Party Boat Blackfish fishing is good. The bag limit goes up to 5 fish in mid month. Tog jigs baited with crab are doing a number on these fish. Porgies are still around along with Ling.

Fresh Water

My wife and I fished the Pequest in mid October for fall Trout. Our biggest problem was low water levels in our favorite spots. All we could do was one Rainbow about 13 inches. I also tried the Black River near Chester the first weekend of this month for a few hours. I managed to catch 2 Rainbows 14 and 15 inches and missed one. I tried the North Branch at Far Hills but didn't do anything except for one possible strike. My wife and I took a long ride up to Tilcon Lake on Election Day. I did nothing but she was able to bring in a 15 inch Landlocked Salmon. Winter Trout stocking in selected lakes starts November 25th.




